

#### THE VICAR WRITES...

#### Hope



By the time you read this article, the first Christmas under COVID restrictions will have taken place; or rather with them temporarily lifted. Will the 'hit' on our NHS be too great? Will we have to go back into lockdown in January, as with Northern Ireland? It's impossible to predict; but the signs aren't too good. The hope, on the horizon now, is that the vaccine(s) will provide the answer.

'Hope' is, of course, a fundamental Christian doctrine, and a sadly underrated one, in my view. (When we read 'faith, hope and love remain, and the greatest of these is love', how many of us think that 'hope' is the poor relation in the triad?) Hope is for the future, and for the 'eschatological' future too – ie for the end of the world; this is what we believe as Christians. C S Lewis talked of four stages of time which he defined as: 1) the past, 2) the present, 3) the future, and 4) the future yet to come. Then he said that the problem with us Christians in the twentieth century is that we spend too much time on 1 and 3 and not enough on 2 and 4.

One of the things lockdown has taught me, through something akin to mindfulness, is to be thankful for the small things in life. Enjoy what we can in the present. But don't neglect the long-term future, when we eventually will come to die. Whatever we believe about the afterlife; surely most of us want to have made a difference, for the good, in our limited lifespan.

However, I have become a little serious. There is hope for our New Year; let's try hard to make it a better one, for all concerned. Perhaps a little more love, of our neighbour, and of God, might be a starting point.

#### **Bishops Clyst Parish Council**



Traffic and Parking Group. Many of you will remember the Parish Council set up the Traffic and Parking Group (T&PG), following a public meeting in November 2018, to investigate the impact of increased traffic on the local community. The

T&PG prepared a comprehensive report, containing recommendations for road network improvements, which was presented at Devon County Council's Full Council Meeting in February 2020. We have now received a response to our report and both documents are available on our website from these links: <u>Bishops Clyst Parish Council Traffic Report</u>; <u>Devon County Council's response</u>. The Parish Council is considering its response.

*Devon Carbon Plan Consultation*. The consultation of the Interim Devon Carbon Plan is now live! The plan is a collaborative roadmap to creating a net-zero Devon where people and nature thrive and is Devon's response to the global climate emergency.

The time has now come for you to offer further thoughts and feedback. Residents are asked to take part in the Interim Devon Carbon Plan consultation, which begins on Monday  $7^{\text{th}}$  December and lasts for ten weeks. Devon Climate Emergency (DCE) partnership wants to hear your views on key actions that outline some of the transformational changes which are required to create a thriving net-zero Devon.

The Interim Devon Carbon Plan will be updated to a final plan after the Citizens' Assembly, now in 2021 due to COVID-19.

The actions cover a broad range of topics which will allow us to build back better. Addressing the climate and ecological emergency is an opportunity to create a fairer, healthier, more resilient and prosperous society.

DCE is requesting feedback from Devon's citizens to indicate to what extent they agree with the proposed actions. Have your say at: <a href="https://www.devonclimateemergency.org.uk/InterimCarbonPlan">www.devonclimateemergency.org.uk/InterimCarbonPlan</a>.

Clyst Valley Regional Park Public Consultation. A public consultation on proposals for a new, public, green space around the Clyst Valley is taking place from Monday 9<sup>th</sup> November 2020 until 12 noon on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> January 2021. The survey has been extended until January to allow for the national coronavirus restrictions currently in force.



The Clyst Valley is on the doorstep of a rapidly growing population to the east of Exeter. To make sure that local people

can explore and enjoy the East Devon countryside, connecting with nature for their health and

wellbeing, the Clyst Valley Regional Park masterplan sets out ideas on how it can be improved in years to come. This plan will provide a basis to seek funding for these improvements.

Some parts of the Clyst Valley are well known, such as National Trust Killerton. Other areas are not currently accessible to the public. The masterplan proposes to restore nature and historic buildings, create trails, tackle climate change and flooding.

Councillor Paul Arnott, Leader of East Devon District Council, said: *This exciting project is central to East Devon's commitment to conserving beautiful areas not protected by formal status as well as encouraging the return of the bio-diversity the world is in desperate need of in the 2020s. I would encourage everyone to take part in this consultation.* 

Councillor Geoff Jung, East Devon District Council's Portfolio Holder for Coast, Country and Environment said: Although the concept of the Clyst Valley Regional Park was agreed through the East Devon Local Plan in 2016 (Strategy 10), this consultation proposes many exciting and creative additions to help provide easier access for people to enjoy this wonderful countryside area on Exeter's doorstep. It will also improve and enhance the biodiversity and habitat, to protect this special area for the long term. Therefore, it is vital that you tell us how you would like to see this valuable 'green space blueprint' develop and grow. I would like all residents and businesses to help us define the priorities of the Park, as it takes shape over the coming years.

Some of the ideas that are suggested in the Clyst Valley Regional Park masterplan are:

- Clyst Valley Trail linking the Exe Estuary Trail to the Exe Valley Way
- Extension to Cranbrook Country Park
- Land-based learning centre and café at Broadclyst Community Farm
- A new cycle trail linking Cranbrook to Exeter along a quiet route
- Renaturalising the River Clyst between Clyst Honiton and Cranbrook
- A major increase in trees through both planting and natural regeneration
- A new visitor hub at Ashclyst Farm and cycle/pedestrian links into the Forest from Cranbrook, Broadclyst and Killerton

#### **Clyst St Mary Flood Defence Improvements: Progress Update**



Following our update in October, when a major part of the works were completed, we have continued to reinstate the bank closest to the bridge. The timber and concrete capping beam to the steel sheet piles is now also complete, along with the king post and plank wall in the northern section.

Due to current high water levels, we have decided to leave the site for a few months during the wetter season. Completion of the earthworks, final reinstatement and landscaping elements

will then be reviewed in February/March, with a view to return and complete in spring 2021, when site constraints allow. Final completion is expected in summer 2021.

Defence levels will be maintained over the winter months to the pre-works standard. Despite further works being required to upgrade the scheme, the works to date already provide added benefits in protecting the village from flooding from the River Clyst floodplain, through installation of the sheet piles.

While we are away, during the next few months, the public right of way and stile at the north end of the site will be opened up and Kier will continue to monitor the site security. #### ATTENTION ALL POULTRY KEEPERS: Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)

Poultry and Other Captive Birds. An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ) has been



declared across the whole of England, effective from 5 pm on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2020. All poultry keepers in England (whether they have commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) are required by law to take a range of biosecurity precautions.

If you keep poultry (including gamebirds or pet birds) or other captive birds, you must act now to reduce the risk of disease in your flock by following the relevant biosecurity measures required within the AIPZ. Your stock needs to be feed and

watered under cover to prevent contamination from wild birds.

Good biosecurity improves the overall health and productivity of your flock by helping keep out poultry diseases such as avian influenza and limiting the spread of disease in an outbreak. All bird gatherings within the AIPZ are prohibited; therefore, the general licence that had permitted bird gatherings has been revoked.

If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline (03459 33 55 77).

Public Health England advises that the risk to the public's health is very low. Food Standards Agency (FSA) has said that on the basis of the current scientific evidence, avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Avian influenza is unconnected with coronavirus (COVID-19).

*Voluntary Registration.* You can choose to register fewer than 50 birds, or birds you keep as pets. The Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) encourages you to register even if you do not have to by law. By registering,

- APHA will be able to contact you if there's a disease outbreak (such as bird flu) in your area;
- You'll help prevent the spread of disease and protect the national poultry flock.

We are very keen to let as many people as possible in communities across the county know that FORCE is still offering support to people in Devon affected by cancer, despite the impact of COVID-19. The virus brings another layer of anxiety and distress for many of the people we support so we quickly adapted our services when the pandemic restricted our ability to offer the face-to-face contact so integral to our mission.

Our main Support Centre in Exeter was temporarily closed and our weekly outreach programmes in East, West and Mid Devon have been severely impacted. But our staff were on the end of a 'phone or video link to offer advice and information on all sorts of things like claiming benefits, accessing our counselling service, how to take exercise that can boost your immune system or just general guidance on coping at such a difficult time.

They were able to answer many of the questions posed in these uncertain times - and not just by cancer patients. FORCE is also supporting families and carers - anyone impacted by a cancer diagnosis in someone they love. Those online services are still available but we are delighted that our Support Centre is now open again, with strict COVID-safe measures in place to protect staff and visitors.

The nurses we fund at the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital are also still able to deliver vital chemotherapy and we have worked closely with the RD&E to develop a new cancer hub in Ottery St Mary.

What has been considerably affected is our income. So many events have been cancelled or postponed and we have had to close our charity shop for significant periods. But we continue to get fantastic support from communities like yours. We still have a significant gap in our finances to plug, but every donation makes a difference and means we can continue to help local people affected by cancer.





A trial to boost re-use of electrical items is taking place at five Household Waste Recycling





In 2018/19, over 7,200 tonnes of electrical items were recycled through Devon's recycling centres and the trial

aims to go one step further and capture any items that are still in good working order to keep them in circulation for longer.

The participating trial sites are:

- Pinbrook Recycling Centre, Exeter
- Ivybridge Recycling Centre
- Brunel Road Recycling Centre, Newton Abbot
- Knowle Hill Recycling Centre, Exmouth
- Bideford Recycling Centre

Residents arriving at participating recycling centres with flat screen TVs, vacuum cleaners or lighting will now be asked by site staff if the item is still working and in good condition. Items that can be re-used will be PAT- and function-tested by trained site staff and then made available in the site's re-use shop for the public to buy, along with furniture, bric-a-brac and other re-usable household items. Non-working electrical items and any failing the testing procedure will be recycled.

It is estimated that following the testing process, 33 per cent of TVs, 50 per cent of vacuums and 72 per cent of lighting/lamps will be suitable to re-use, meaning an additional 48 tonnes of electrical goods will be re-used per year at participating sites.

Recycling centre resale shops are popular with the public as they offer a range of household items at affordable prices. Public demand for resale shops to include electrical items has grown

as budget-savvy shoppers embrace the cost savings of buying re-usable goods, whilst also benefiting the environment.

The grant funding has helped provide workshop and testing facilities as well as staff training to allow re-usable items to be function and safety tested prior to resale. It is anticipated that the scheme will be self-financing going forward which will help keep it going.

We really look forward to seeing you, this winter and beyond, and from all of the Love Topsham team, have a peaceful and prosperous New Year!




