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
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THE VICAR WRITES...



We are just about to celebrate the week of Christian Unity, and for one ZOOM service I included a meditation upon the following gospel passage: Matthew 20: 20-27. I will include part of the meditation at the end of this article. For those of you not familiar with this passage (do look it up), it's where two disciples who are brothers (John and James) ask Jesus, spurred on by their mother, for a special place in

heaven. Unsurprisingly, Jesus rebukes them for their lack of understanding.

In these days of some countries potentially 'jumping the queue' for coronavirus vaccines, it's a sober reminder for us all. Perhaps it's brought home even more sharply when some 70+ year - olds may be receiving the vaccine before 80 year- olds, let alone some of the keyworkers not being immunised yet.

This passage appropriately reminds us of the need for humility, a theme of the church's for this (last) month. The meditation goes as follows, narrated by either James or John, with my comments in [square brackets]. It's based upon a reflection from Nick Fawcett, 'No ordinary man' 2000: 140-141, # 38:

I've never been so embarrassed; the way his [Jesus'] face fell as we stood before him will be etched on my memory forever.

Oh, he tried to let us down gently... but I could tell he was disappointed...that we should even have thought of asking.

To be fair, it was our mother's idea; even though we played along quite happily...

Think of the future, she told us What's going to happen then?

And she was genuinely troubled...

we'd packed in our jobs... everything, to follow Jesus, and she wanted to know, quite simply, what was in it for us. Yes, it might sound shabby now, a sordid quest for gain, but at the time it sounded quite reasonable, a quite natural thing to ask.

[For those of us who have sacrificed things during the lockdown; do any of these sentiments ring a bell?]

After all, we'd no idea what the future might bring, what demands it might make of us, what sacrifices expected, so it seemed only fair to seek some assurances...

...[W]e'd been the first to respond, so why not be the first to benefit? - it wasn't like we were jumping the queue.

Only that's not how others saw it! [Here they are referring to the other disciples; to say they were displeased is an understatement]

They were incensed, more angry than I'd ever seen them. As to the[ir] accusations...that's best left unsaid. But with Jesus it was different.

There was no anger from him, no disgust...rather...anxiety, concern.

It was as though we were spoilt children with no idea what we were asking -We'd followed him, listened to his words, witnessed his deeds, but we'd taken in precious little of what he tried to show.

We knew he was special, the promised Messiah, the Son of God, but we hadn't begun to understand what that meant.

We thought we were serving him, but we were still serving self, ...all that really mattered to us.

No wonder he shook his head. It was a moment I prefer to forget, except for one thing: it taught us something we needed to learn, something we should have seen sooner

the truth that those who wish for greatness will never find it, that those who strive to be first will be last, and that the last will be first.

Words not just for current and previous presidents, but also for our humble (I hope) selves. May we learn to serve others during this pandemic – I speak to myself. Amen. Bill and Daff Lemmey, Woodbury Vicarage <u>revbillwhitecross@gmail.com</u>

So not quite the New Year we had hoped for but the days are lengthening and there are occasional glimpses of spring to way to ravitalise us

sunshine and spring bulbs to tell us the new season is on its way to revitalise us.

Regrettably we have had to cancel the last few visits planned for prospective parents of children due to start school in September and by the time you read this the deadline for applications will have passed. We have a new virtual tour on our website which can be found at https://www.clyststmary.devon.sch.uk/welcome/. This provides a flavour of our ethos and all

we offer children joining us and we hope that it goes some way to replacing the face-to-face visits we'd much prefer to have.

The new term and its return to online learning for many of our children has seen us all honing our technology skills further with each class having daily, live Google Meets for learning and wellbeing and assemblies shared within school and beyond. The use of technology for learning has been supported by the delivery of books and paperwork to children working exclusively at home as we aim for children to continue using traditional creative skills: writing, drawing, etc alongside technology and we'd like to thank staff and governors who went the extra mile (literally!) to deliver these items. We have also loaned a number of Chromebooks to our families to support children's access to learning.

We know that children will be learning remotely, until at least the middle of February and maybe beyond, so we are planning to hold many of this half term's annual events online. Our School Council representatives have been meeting, socially distanced in the playground and online and planned a rainbow event for 29th January when the children dressed up in rainbow colours to raise funds for one of the wards at the RD&E. We hope people kept an eye on our website for what will have been a very colourful video and photos.

It is especially important, with children's currently increased use of technology, to keep online safety at the forefront of all our minds and this is always a keen focus for our school. February's annual, global Safer Internet Day (oth February) is traditionally a big event in school when the children amaze us with their knowledge and understanding of the positives and negatives of

technology and this year will be no different. Please visit our website after the event and find out what the children can teach us about the online world.



Life is tough for many in our school and wider community at present. Being at home, trying to work and homeschool kids, is a very demanding task and the opportunities for relief are limited by the need to restrict social contacts and control COVID-19. We ended the year with a wet December here at Ebford, recording 139 mm (5.5 inches) - almost as much rain as in February. The 2020 annual amount was 876 mm (34.5 inches).

This curiously is roughly the same as the yearly average between 2011 and 2020

of 35.3 inches. However, the yearly average between 2001 and 2010 was only 29.7 inches. So our weather does seem to be getting wetter and also significantly warmer in the summer, according to the Met Office and local experience. An Expensive Disaster

ATTENTION ALL POULTRY KEEPERS: Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)

Poultry and Other Captive Birds. An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ) was declared



across the whole of England, effective from 5 pm on 11th November 2020. All poultry keepers in England (whether they have commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) are required by law to take a range of biosecurity precautions.

If you keep poultry (including gamebirds or pet birds) or other captive birds, you must act now to reduce the risk of disease in your flock by following the relevant biosecurity measures required within the AIPZ. Your stock needs to be feed and

watered under cover to prevent contamination from wild birds.

Good biosecurity improves the overall health and productivity of your flock by helping keep out poultry diseases such as avian influenza and limiting the spread of disease in an outbreak. All bird gatherings within the AIPZ are prohibited; therefore, the general licence that had permitted bird gatherings has been revoked.

For more guidance please visit <u>https://www.gov.uk/guidance/avian-influenza-bird-flu</u>. If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline (03459 33 55 77).

Public Health England advises that the risk to the public's health is very low. Food Standards Agency (FSA) has said that on the basis of the current scientific evidence, avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Avian influenza is unconnected with coronavirus (COVID-19).

Voluntary Registration. You can choose to register fewer than 50 birds, or birds you keep as pets. The Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) encourages you to register even if you do not have to by law. By registering,

- APHA will be able to contact you if there's a disease outbreak (such as bird flu) in your area;
- You'll help prevent the spread of disease and protect the national poultry flock.



We are very keen to let as many people as possible in communities across the county know that FORCE is still offering support to people in Devon affected by cancer, despite the impact of COVID-19. The virus brings another layer of anxiety and distress for many of the people we support so we quickly adapted our services when the pandemic restricted our ability to offer the face-to-face contact so integral to our mission.

Our main Support Centre in Exeter was temporarily closed and our weekly outreach programmes in East, West and Mid Devon have been severely impacted. But our staff were on the end of a 'phone or video link to offer advice and information on all sorts of things like claiming benefits, accessing our counselling service, how to take exercise that can boost your immune system or just general guidance on coping at such a difficult time. They were able to answer many of the questions posed in these uncertain times - and not just by cancer patients. FORCE is also supporting families and carers anyone impacted by a cancer diagnosis in someone they love. Those online services are still available but we are delighted that our Support Centre is now open again, with strict COVID-safe measures in place to protect staff and visitors.

The nurses we fund at the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital are also still able to deliver vital chemotherapy and we have worked closely with the RD&E to develop a new cancer hub in Ottery St Mary.

What has been considerably affected is our income. So many events have been cancelled or postponed and we have had to close our charity shop for significant periods. But we continue to get fantastic support from communities like yours. We still have a significant gap in our finances to plug, but every donation makes a difference and means we can continue to help local people affected by cancer. Thank you for your continued support.

Census 2021

Households across the nation will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021. The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941. The Census is a snapshot of who we are and how we live our lives. The information is vital for

assessing community needs for services such as schools and doctors' surgeries as well as how our communities are made up and changing.

Census weekend is 21st March. It is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them. Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

A trial to boost re-use of electrical items is taking place at five Household Waste Recycling Centres across Devon.

The project, funded by the electricals industry to encourage the re-use of electrical items, will initially focus on flat screen TVs, vacuum cleaners and lighting.

In 2018/19, over 7,200 tonnes of electrical items were recycled through Devon's recycling centres and the trial aims to go one step further and capture any items that are still in good working order to keep them in circulation for longer.

The participating trial sites are:

- Pinbrook Recycling Centre, Exeter
- Ivybridge Recycling Centre
- Brunel Road Recycling Centre, Newton Abbot
- Knowle Hill Recycling Centre, Exmouth
- Bideford Recycling Centre

Residents arriving at participating recycling centres with flat screen TVs, vacuum cleaners or lighting will now be asked by site staff if the item is still working and in good condition. Items that can be re-used will be PAT- and function-tested by trained site staff and then made available in the site's re-use shop for the public to buy, along with furniture, bric-a-brac and other re-usable household



items. Non-working electrical items and any failing the testing procedure will be recycled. It is estimated that following the testing process, 33 per cent of TVs, 50 per cent of vacuums and 72 per cent of lighting/lamps will be suitable to re-use, meaning an additional 48 tonnes of electrical goods will be re-used per year at participating sites.

Recycling centre resale shops are popular with the public as they offer a range of household items at affordable prices. Public demand for resale shops to include electrical items has grown as budget-savvy shoppers embrace the cost savings of buying re-usable goods, whilst also benefiting the environment.

The grant funding has helped provide workshop and testing facilities as well as staff training to allow re-usable items to be function and safety tested prior to resale. It is anticipated that the scheme will be self-financing going forward which will help keep it going.
