THE VICAR WRITES... **Recovering Judas!**



I am not, now, a betting man, but if I were, I would offer you a hundred to one on this bet. I want you, in your heads to list the first (or Christian) names of all your acquaintances - up to say one hundred or so. Then group them together if they share the same name. My bet is that none of them will be called 'Judas'. Most English-speaking Christians would probably

not choose to use that name. The name itself is a Hellenised version of the Jewish 'Judah'. coming from the Hebrew for 'to praise'. So – do I owe you £100, or do you owe me a guid – only joking!

What happened to Judas? He killed himself, we know that, according to two different accounts in the Bible, but they disagree in the manner of his death. We assume because he couldn't live with what he had done; but do we know that for sure? The gospel writers are clear (that is Luke in Acts and the author of John) that this was to fulfil Hebrew scripture; but they would say that, of course.

But did he go to hell? And if he did; did he stay there? Since about the middle of the last century, there has been an attempt to re-evaluate Judas and his role. D L Savers, and many others have followed, chose to make him a Zealot, like Simon the Zealot, who thought Jesus should have brought in his 'kingdom' more quickly and effectively, presumably by force. This works well dramatically, but is it true? Probably not, but we don't know – it's as plausible as most other explanations.

In Holy Week, on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday, there is an Orthodox, and Catholic, tradition that Jesus went to hell and 'harrowed' it: I have an icon which reflects this. Often Jesus is seen pulling Adam and Eve up out of hell. I like the idea of Jesus doing this with Judas, as one Catholic website suggested; but of course there is no Biblical source for this.

Whatever did happen to Judas, I think, in this modern age it is time to re-examine him and his role in the Passion of Christ; perhaps he just had to be there to do what he had to do. Maybe, just maybe, that might be a help when someone calls us a 'Judas', or even that we have betraved them. Others have gone before us. And maybe, just maybe, Jesus redeemed Judas after death - who knows.

Before I get accused of heresy, I would like to close with quite a well-known, I think powerful poem, called *The Ballad of the Judas Tree*; I know nothing about the author – maybe a reader could tell me. Let's not be too quick to condemn.

The Ballad of the Judas Tree by Ruth Etchells

- (1) In Hell there grew a Judas Tree Where Judas hanged and died Because he could not bear to see His master crucified.
- (2) Our Lord descended into Hell And found his Judas there For ever hanging on the tree Grown from his own despair.
- (3) So Jesus cut his Judas down And took him in his arms. "It was for this I came," he said. "And not to do you harm.

thank Liz Whittaker who supported our planning for these activities by leading a staff walk around the village and providing so much background invaluable information.





The first Family Service in church now our churches have reopened took place on 18th April; Debbie Jung took the service. Fiona Vessey read the Bible story and Robin Lee led prayers, which included some for the Queen and her family following the funeral service the day before for Prince Philip. Debbie talked about coming out of lockdown and invited people to write on pieces of paper what they thought were positive things to have come out of the period of lockdown. Some wrote of having more family time, more appreciation of nature, the kindness of people helping others, etc. After the service Debbie stuck these as leaves on a Tree of Hope which will be displayed at the back of the church.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The APCM meeting was held via Zoom. In the Vestry Meeting Debbie Jung was unanimously re-elected as Churchwarden and Mark Lovett had also agreed to stand and was also unanimously elected. We now have two Churchwardens! Debbie was warmly thanked for all her work.

Members of the PCC were re-elected en bloc, apart from Biddy Lagus, who did not wish to continue as a member. The PCC now comprises Debbie, Mark, Phil Dent, Nigel and Jill Dupain, Robin Lee and Katharine Wheeler. Fiona Vessey is co-opted as Minutes Secretary. Debbie will continue as Synod Representative.

A meeting of the PCC followed. Jill will continue as Secretary and Nigel as Treasurer. In her Churchwarden's report Debbie expressed thanks to the Parish Council for paying for the repairs to the lightning conductor (£1,280.40).

Future fund-raising events were discussed:






