



A MESSAGE FROM CHRISTINE GRIST AND DEBBIE JUNG

Looking after God's World - Hope for the Future



Matthew 19 v 13-14: Then people brought little children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them and pray for them. But the disciples rebuked them. Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.'

Jesus' common remedy was to lift up the attitude and trusting humility of children as one to emulate. Not only did Jesus make time to spend with children in order to bless them, he said that to them belongs the kingdom

of heaven.

On Sunday 27thJune our monthly Mission Community family *Zoom* service focused on climate change, a subject close to the heart of our young people. As usual it was a lively session with everyone contributing to the discussion. We focused on COP26, a climate change conference to be held in Glasgow in November and talked about how there is a relay to carry a model boat from Exeter to Glasgow. The young people discussed how they would present themselves if they were fortunate enough to attend.

Climate change is probably one of the most talked about subjects this year, except Covid! From climate change issues we also think about how the world got into the state it is. Plastic waste, micro-plastics in the sea and the extinction and near extinction of many of the plants and animals are also subjects that the children talked about. We have been given the responsibility by God to be good stewards of our planet Earth. We are to care for the planet and all that lives in it – plants, fish, animals and of course ourselves and one another. Not only these things but also the responsible way we use and share the Earth's resources.

The task for this service was for everyone to write some poems and prayers that we could use in our churches.

These are four of the poems by the children. There is nothing more to add, except that these thoughts should give all God's children, of any age, hope for the future.

1. God made this world for a reason He gave it to us as a gift And as a responsibility To prepare us for tests in the future.

God has created a beautiful world, Full on wonder and magic. All animals are here for a reason. We are the shepherds of God's sheep. Everything in God's house has a purpose, Nothing is left out.

God has given us this gift for us to look after and care for.

He has given us free will to make our own choice. We should care for this world of wonder As he cares for us.

Look after the world for the next generation.

2. Our world is great. We have so much to love, Let's save our planet Made by God above

You've given us our family and friends You've led us through the twists and bends, Let's love our world before it's too late Life is great, let's celebrate!

3. God created day and night He made the sky and land just right He made all the plants, flowers and trees:

To give us food, fruit and seeds. He made the sun to light our days, the moon, all stars and the 'milky way'. Then He made fish to swim in the sea, Birds and butterflies, animals and ME! 4. God, you gently waken me as the darkness fades to light, My eves begin to open as you fold away the night, You colour every morning sky to change throughout the day, And when it's time to rest, you tuck the sun away.

A prayer by the children to care for our planet that God made. Thank you, God, for our lovely planet that you have created. For the rainforests which help us make our air. We are sorry for the rubbish we leave – the animals that we have made extinct – the deforestation – our sins against the planet. Please help us to recycle – not to be so wasteful – look after each other – give us courage to be kind to each other. Amen.

Norman's Weather Report



So the 'flaming' dry period did materialise during the first half of June with 'hay making' conditions quite prevalent and widespread. However, on the 19th, 20th and 21st a mini-monsoon descended on Ebford producing 34 mm of rain, followed by a very wet Sunday and night a week later on the 27th giving another 1.36 inches.

The total for June was 70 mm (2.8 inches) of rain, nearly all of which fell during the period 19th to 28th. Average value for June over the last 20 years here at Ebford drops in at 63 mm (2.5 inches).

The first third of July has been rather unsettled, good for gardens but not so far for outdoor sports and holidays! [That has now changed dramatically! Ed] Norman Cann

It is the end of the summer term (almost) and at this time the children will be saying a big thank you to the staff and parent volunteers who make Woodbury Salterton a very special place to learn. As part of the national Thank You Day, which was on 4th July, the children in each class made their own thank you poster. Classes all around

the country will have made cards to say thank you to those who have helped in the pandemic. The day was supported by Charlie Mackesy who is an artist and author- you may have seen his work online with beautiful images of a boy, a fox, a mole and a horse. His illustrations explore kindness and understanding; values held precious in our school. We want to share this message with you from Thank You Day and all those who have helped us through this challenging time. *About Thank You Day*

After eighteen long months, the end of lockdown is finally in sight.

It's been an experience that has tested everyone.

But from the beginning, we've been helping each other through.

As families, streets and communities – checking in on each other, making sure neighbours are ok, going to work when we had to and staying at home whenever we were told.

The crisis has reminded us all that when it really matters, we're here for one another, and that's something to be grateful for.

Before normal life takes over again, we want to pause and say thank you to everyone who helped. From neighbours who kept the noise down or dropped off the shopping, mum and dad for putting up with us under the same roof, delivery drivers and supermarket security guards who kept us fed, local shopkeepers who stayed open, care workers, doctors, nurses, volunteers, and everyone who obeyed the rules; we couldn't have done it without each other. The summer term has given the children the opportunity to use our outdoor spaces to learn and work together safely. Even though the sun hasn't always shone the tranquillity of the Glebe Field and our forest school site on Stony Lane is a welcome haven for learning.

Class 3 loved practising their athletics; racing in teams and long jump. They were all brilliant at encouraging everyone else on. With our visiting coach Becky



Mason from the Dartmoor School Sport Partnership the children have learnt Dartmoor 3 Balls, a game invented by Becky and her team about 15 years ago to include all children, giving them the opportunity to practise striking and fielding skills. The



game requires lots of teamwork and communication; it was great to

see children trying their hardest and never giving up!

Class 3 also enjoy playing handball matches with their coach Tom; putting their throwing, catching and dodging skills to the test! Frisbee has also been really popular this term.

Learning outside can support learning in the classroom; again, with the support of Becky



Mason the children followed map symbols to track a route across coloured cones. They learnt how to orient the map and follow the pathway; following a map of clues to find superhero answers as part of a maths challenge.

One of the children's favourite places to learn is our forest school tucked away in Stony Lane. Here the

children have thought about their memories of forest school and what has



been special for us. They have used sawing skills to make wooden necklaces and decorated them with memories, they created a treasure hunt to find letters of the alphabet that when put together, made the word 'Bushcraft'. They like ending their sessions with delicious toasted marshmallows.



The older children love forest school giving them time to play and learn together making a magnificent marble run, working with one another, enjoying finding and learning about bugs,



insects and natural objects during a scavenger hunt. Their outdoor learning links with the classroom as they used their skills to think about shape properties and angles in maths putting these skills to great use as they marked out a hexagonal space for our new wild flower area. Calling All Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprises Across East Devon to Have Their Say on the Support That Could Be Available to Them!



A Council for Voluntary Service provides support, guidance, networking opportunities and training to the VCSE sector in local areas. Every area of Devon currently has a Council for Voluntary Service, with the exception of East Devon. There are some issues with this lack of provision, which became more evident during the first wave of the Coronavirus pandemic, when both existing and new

voluntary and community groups came under pressure and struggled to find support if they needed it. A temporary support arrangement was commissioned by Devon County Council to provide basic guidance and advice, but this was limited and this contract has now ended.

East Devon District Council has drafted a discussion document, which outlines what this potential support could look like, and what its aims could be. Some voluntary and community groups have already been involved in part of this. The council now wants feedback on the document from all of East Devon's voluntary, community and social enterprise groups, which is available online along with a questionnaire.

Cllr Megan Armstrong, East Devon District Council Portfolio Holder for Sustainable Homes and Communities, said: 'We witnessed an impressive and overwhelmingly positive effort by voluntary, community and social enterprise groups during the pandemic, which clearly demonstrated the value of their work in communities.

'We recognise that community groups of all shapes and sizes would benefit from support allowing them to focus on what they do best, by helping them in ways that they would find useful. We would like to work with the groups to develop a proposal for provision of this support, then further consider the funding options to pay for it once we know what is needed." 




