



THE VICAR WRITES...



I am reading a book telling the back-story of the popular TV series Grantchester, written by a son of the previous Archbishop Runcie; I expect some of you reading this will have seen some of the series. Being a back-story, it fills in the gaps of the clergy-detective's (Sidney) wartime experience. Incidentally, there has been a long history of a crossover between Anglicanism and detective fiction; take P D James, for example. Sidney seems to spend

more time 'sleuthing' than working, but there needs to be some dramatic licence, I guess.

However, I digress. Sidney's wartime experiences (as an agnostic/atheist) have caused me to reflect on the parallels between returners from active wartime service and Covid survivors. Of course, I am not in any way decrying the sacrifices that our war heroes made. But there is an interesting link between the sense of unsureness that emerged after WW2 and the current uncertainty about what the 'new normal' will be like; interestingly, the book was written the year *before* the pandemic; so we can't see it as being prescient.

Of course, the book is also about Sidney's calling; his role in life. When I finish it, no doubt it will explain (a little at least) how he ends up becoming a clergyman in Grantchester. During the war his chaplain is 'Rev Nev' who has a formative influence upon him. They joke that were the chaplain to marry a Beverley, they could have children named Trevor and Neville. I'm sure you can shorten it out (appalling pun intended).

So - he recovers a sense of purpose in a seemingly purposeless world. Does that ring any bells for any of us? Well, for committed Christians, this shouldn't, of course, be the case. But what about those who are less sure?

For those of us who are churchgoers, of whatever denomination, there is going to be a lot of rethinking about what church is, and who it is for. These are not new questions; we did a Lent course in the Mission Community based upon a booklet which was over forty years old! You may recall it was punningly titled: What on earth is the church for?

For those of us who feel a need to do God's work; hopefully all of the above and more; we may want to listen a little more closely to that 'still quiet voice' inside us: maybe now is a time to look at doing something new, something less, something more fulfilling, something that might help others along a bit (for example).

We are not all, thank goodness, called to the ordained ministry, like Sidney, but I do believe we are all called, whether we like it or not, to God's work, whether as a teacher, a hospital worker, a retired intercessor, or a family supporter (to name but four examples). What is your calling? Let's hope when we eventually arrive at the so-called new normal, it will be more, not less, fulfilling for us.


Whatever you choose, may the road rise to meet you and God hold you in the palm of God's hand. Amen.

Bishops Clyst Parish Council



Flood Protection Scheme. During an informal discussion with contractors, it appears the penultimate chapter of the Environment Agency's Flood Protection Scheme is now well under way, after weather delays in May. This is to build up the access road and bank around Mill House and Mill Cottage to the same level as the already completed bank running the length of Frog Lane. The final stage will be the installation of the stop logs on the Old Bridge and across the farm track behind Millstream Cottage. These are subject to delay, as the foundations for them on the Old Bridge uncovered BT services, which must be adjusted under BT supervision. This means, we understand, a possible delay of up to eight weeks. Final details such as barriers to stop access on to the flood wall are also to be fitted. This means we should be fully protected by the end of the summer.

The Flood Group is meeting with Tom Walling of the Environment Agency on Monday 28th June 2021 to begin working on the protocol for fitting the stop logs. [See also below.]

Greenspire to Clyst St Mary Village Footpath. We would like to reassure residents that this footpath project is in hand and detailed plans are in the process of being developed by the appointed consulting engineers for submission to Devon County Council.


spacious and can be well ventilated.

The Environment Agency would like to thank local residents and businesses once again for their patience while the essential improvement works to flood defences at Clyst St Mary are carried out.

Our works have continued with the reinstatement of the leat and works at the northern end of the scheme, although unfortunately,

there have been some delays in the final elements of construction, and the project will need to continue work over the summer months. There will also be some changes to the design around Mill House. The Environment Agency will write to update locals once updated timescales are confirmed.

CSG Parish Council Chairman's Notes, July 2021

At our AGM I was re-elected as Chair and at our monthly meeting the Council co-opted Mrs Jeanette McDonald. She is a long time resident of the parish so I am sure she will bring some new insights to the PC.

It's hall in the name! We have one hall in Clyst St George but it is known as either the Village Hall or the Parish Hall. The Trustees have now decided that we wish it to be knwn as Clyst St George Parish Hall. Why? In 1931 when the Hall was built, on land donated by Lord Wraxhall, Major Gibbs named it Ebford and Clyst St George Parish Hall; at that time Ebford was in the

Parish of Woodbury but some of the original committee running the Hall were from Ebford and so it has remained. Ebford is now part of CSG Parish and the charity running the Hall is 'Clyst St George & Ebford Parish Hall'. That won't change but it is bit too long, so the decision to rebrand it has been taken; signs and logos will be changed in the coming months. Norman's Weather Report



How dramatic the change from the drought conditions of March and April to the monsoon of May! Two days, 12th and 13th May, gave us 60 mm of rain here at Ebford - 10 mm more than the total for both March and April this year.

May started with over an inch during the first week and over four inches in the second week. The third week vielded another inch of thundery shower rain; the month's total was a recordbreaking 177 mm or 7 inches of rain. Last year, in the middle of the first lockdown, May's total was only 9 mm, which made it the driest month of 2020.

The May average amount here at Ebford over the last 20 years has been almost exactly 2 inches. In this context, the last ten years have been significantly drier than the previous decade; with May 2007 and May 2008 recording about 5 inches each.

As I report now at the end of June's first week, a 'flaming' dry period appears to be approaching. Norman Cann

The penultimate chapter of the EA's Flood Protection Scheme is now well under way, after weather delays in May. This is to build up the access road and bank around Mill House and Mill Cottage to the same level as the already completed bank running the length of Frog Lane.

The final stage will be the installation of the stop logs on the Old Bridge and across the farm track

behind Millstream Cottage. These are subject to delay, as the foundations for them on the Old Bridge uncovered BT services, which must be adjusted under BT supervision. This means, I am told by the





site foreman, a possible delay of up to eight weeks. Final details such as barriers to stop access onto the flood wall are also to be fitted. So by the end of the summer we should be fully protected.
