CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE VICARAGE



I was listening to *Thought for the Day* a couple of weeks before Christmas, and it gave me the idea for a short talk for the Carol Service. The speaker was a Christian writer called Rhidion Brook who has written a book called 'Godbothering'. I've used his thought as a starting point...

The other day I was trying to get through to a utility company to complain about the rising costs of energy when I was put through to a 'robot'. After selecting various numbers, I was informed that the lines were 'experiencing an unusually high volume of calls' (it would *really* be unusual if they *weren't*) - and that it would take over half an hour to get through to a human being. Meanwhile there was canned music, and every so often a voice would tell me that my call mattered to them, and that I was, slowly, moving up the queue. Did anyone care? To start with I thought so, but the music began to grate. Did anyone care? The message told me that my call was important, but the more I heard this recording, the more, paradoxically, the opposite seemed to be true. 'Your custom is important for us'...*is it*?

I think about my power company; my power needs. I am informed by my robot that my power company has merged with another power company, making it bigger and therefore even more reliable. I spare a thought for the smaller companies; over 25 of them that have gone under. I also spare a thought for those in fuel poverty – over 1.4m of them, according to the Joseph Rowntree Foundation.

The upbeat music is by now oddly dispiriting. The whole process has made me *power-less*. So I start to think about where my power does come from. Is it from one of those ex-Soviet bloc countries that could just turn off the power?

How reliable is it? Can I afford its ever-increasing cost? Perhaps the energy companies aren't powerful, but are more like the Wizard of Oz - tucked at the back of a room somewhere operating a large machine, designed to make us think someone is in control.

If only there was a power that I could depend upon...One who didn't keep me waiting...Someone whose power never dies. Someone who knows who I am. Who won't keep me waiting and will speak to me in person...

In Advent we waited four and a bit weeks for such a person; the time between the end of the OT and the beginning of the NT is about 400 years. Does this put my 40 minutes' wait into perspective? At the beginning of February, we will come to the end of the Christmas/Epiphany season, remembering someone else who waited – most of his long life – to see the Saviour of the world – his name was Simeon (read about it in Luke 2: 22 - 35).

I am about to give up, thinking about waiting for the second coming instead, when a real voice says: 'I'm sorry you had to wait so long. How can I help you?'

How can God help us in this season? What have we been waiting for all our lives?? Seasonal blessings. (With thanks to Rhidion Brook for getting me started!)

#### Clyst St Mary Primary School in Project with Tanzania



Year 6 and the School Council are involved in an amazing project with the British Council and Surfers Against Sewage, with a school in Dar es Salaam, in Tanzania. We are looking at ways to

reduce the use of single-use plastic and to reuse and recycle plastics. This is in conjunction with COP 26. The School Council is democratically voted for on an annual basis at present, and each member represents their class (Class 2 - Class 6 have representatives).

CSMPS and the School Council are looking at ways to reduce the use of single-use plastic in lunch boxes plastics such as: cling film, food wrappers, yoghurt pots, non-reusable drinks bottles, etc. These cause harm to wildlife and their habitats and pollute the sea. The School Council have audited lunch boxes, sent an email to parents and carers requesting help in reducing the use of single-use plastics in lunchboxes and litter picked in the school grounds and the village play park.

Year 6 have had a number of Google meets with Class 3 at Milimani School in Tanzania, and have shared their herb growing project and the Tanzanian school have sent photos of their tree watering project. And three teachers, Ellie, Harriet and Mandie, have met Hanifa (the Milimani class teacher) via WhatsApp and GoogleMeet and are in contact via email. We have future dates to meet and talk about the mutual projects. Very exciting and beneficial for all the pupils in Clyst St Mary and Milimani!



#### Clyst St Mary Flood Defences: Environment Agency Update December 2021



The Environment Agency's construction works to deliver the new flood defences for Clyst St Mary are now complete. The works provide a continuous line of defence, extending from high ground at the northern end of Frog Lane to the dual carriageway at the southern end of the village. A high standard of protection from river flooding is now afforded to the community.

Our contractors demobilised from site in early December, following the final elements of work at the 'Old Mill' and 'Old

Bridge', where demountable structures are to be used to provide the protection from flooding. Trial fitting exercises for these structures have successfully been completed and we are working with the local Flood Group to train community volunteers in their use. The project has provided improved monitoring of water levels in the floodplain adjoining the village, which will assist with the accurate provision of flood warning information and the need to trigger community involvement from





our incident room.

Once again we would like to thank the people of Clyst St Mary for their patience and understanding during these works and we trust that the defences will been seen as a valuable asset to the community in the event of future flooding and climate change scenarios.

#### Norman's Weather Report



Rainfall here at Ebford in November was at a 20-year low of 15 mm (0.6 inch). Interestingly, only 25 mm fell in the Novembers of 2001 and 2004. This very low amount was preceded by 169 mm in October. In the spring of this year 16mm fell in April, to be followed by 177 mm in May; very wide monthly variations!

The recent ten-year November average here at Ebford is 105 mm (4.1 inches); so normally a moderate to heavy amount would be expected. In our warming world, 'proper' seasonal weather seems to be becoming increasingly rare', in the words of the Saturday *Telegraph* of 6.112.21. Norman Cann

#### Woodbury Salterton C of E Primary School



*Class 1*. Class 1 has some budding builders who have been learning all about how

to build strong structures. They put this learning to good use during the building stage of their design and technology sequence

creating a stable structure. Using previous knowledge of cardboard attachments, the children joined boxes carefully thinking about which methods would make their structures strong.



In their art lesson Class 1 used their knowledge of different pencil techniques to help them draw features of

a building. The children looked carefully at the detail in each feature of the school building and had a go at drawing them.

A special visitor came from Devon and Somerset Fire Service. The children learnt some really important lessons such as which number to call in an emergency, which hazards to look out for in the house and how to 'Stop, Drop and Roll!'. They also talked a lot about what the fire and rescue service do and how they help people. Now the children know how to be safe at home and know who to call if they need help.

Class 2. In ICT, Class 2 have progressed from learning what the word 'algorithm' means and



progressed on to sing bee-bots to break problems up into smaller parts. They learned how to give a series of instructions to the bee-bots and how to stop and clear the commands.

As part of Interfaith Week, Class 2 have been learning that people of different religions worship in a variety of ways and in different buildings. They

researched lots of different places of worship and created sunset silhouettes to celebrate many of the different places of worship that they learnt about.

As part of the Coastline theme in DT, Class 2 have been busy using all their construction skills to strengthen, score and join as they build mini-beach huts with nets. They then chose a suitable material to make cladding to cover the side of the beach huts and mixed bright colours to make them stand out and learned to make all the colours they needed using primary colours.





*Class 3*. Class 3 have been learning about the different biomes located around the world. They have used atlases to locate them and have researched the climate, fauna and flora found in each of the six main biomes across the world.
