






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
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MESSAGE FROM THE VICARAGE



This is the story given by an assistant curate of the first time she went to church – for a small congregation. If the words are hers, I will use *italics*. My apologies for my non-churchgoing readers, but I am sure you can draw parallels in more secular life.

When the curate was fourteen, she turned up at a church unaccompanied, was given a pile of books and papers and told to sit

wherever she liked. So, she says, 'I slipped in at the back...and was totally baffled.' The vicar did try to help giving page numbers, but they were wrong! (I know that feeling.) She continues: '...by the end, I had decided that this church thing wasn't for me. It didn't make sense. I hadn't got anything out of it and wouldn't be going back. That might have been the end of the story, if it weren't for Patricia.'

This lady, in her eighties, wasn't an evangelist, but simply said: '*Hello, dear, you're new, aren't you? I'm sorry I didn't see you come in or I would have asked you to sit with me. Would you like to sit with me next week?*' The teenager, brought up not to disappoint old ladies, agreed and went back the next week to sit with her. And...she kept going to church, amazingly.

All Patricia did was to point out what page we were on and telling her when to stand or sit. *'That's it. That's all she did. No proclamation of the faith, no moment of "conversion"".*' But as a result, Patricia helped the young woman encounter God. *'Quietly, unspectacularly, on an ordinary Sunday, this very unassuming woman changed my life...by her gentle witness to the steadfastness of God.'*

In her article the curate points out that Jesus regularly calls our attention to the small and the ordinary, and people like Patricia. There are many 'Patricias' in our church communities and in our villages. But are you one of them; would you have behaved in a similar neighbourly way in a similar situation? The problem of course is that our 'British stand-offishness' doesn't help. Nevertheless, I hope and pray that you would do the same as Patricia, whatever your belief, whatever your 'churchpersonship' (forgive the use of this word).

The curate finishes, as do I, with this paragraph: 'Anyway, all this is to say: don't underestimate the Patricias in your congregations...Pray for them, and thank God for their quiet, hidden ministry and faithfulness – even if neither you nor they will ever see the fruit of it.'

EDITOR'S NOTE



Hello and welcome to this February edition of the Clyst Valley News. I hope you've been able to enjoy the lovely, crisp, sunny days which have interspersed the rather less exciting rainy and windy ones that typify the weather patterns at this time of year. My thanks to Jacqueline Ranft for our very striking cover photo this month of Winslade Manor in its Christmas décor. A nice, cheering image, even though the festive season is past now. (I

realise too late that the black and white version of the photo on the printed copies of the CVN will not do justice to the fabulous blue illumination – so do please try and see it in colour online.)

A quick theological lesson: Ash Wednesday just escapes this month and falls on 2^{nd} March this year – the first time not in February since 2019. This is all because Easter, as you will know, is a 'movable feast', traditionally celebrated on the first Sunday following the full moon – officially called 'Paschal Full Moon' – that occurs on or after the spring equinox. The Christian Church calendars state that the spring equinox always falls on 21^{st} March, whether that's scientifically correct or not. So Ash Wednesday always falls six weeks and four days (ie the 46 days of Lent) before Easter Sunday which will be 17^{th} April this year. C'mon. keep up!

So, why am I bringing this up now? Well, your humble editor is nothing if not pragmatic. Covid restrictions, allied with sugary festive season excesses, have done little to keep the editorial waistline in trim condition; so knowing how far ahead the precise date of the start of Lent is, when the planned privations will hopefully engage the girth-reduction process, becomes a matter of serious concern. The later date this year is a mixed blessing: nice that I've still got a few weeks of indulgence left before I don the hair shirt; guilt-inducing because I really do want to hide the choccies away very soon! My way of dealing with this painful dilemma? Planning a phased scaling down of choccie intake over the precise number of days remaining to Ash Wednesday, thus making the transition to total abstinence for Lent more manageable. The only snag is how to factor in the consumption of a sizeable pile of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. I'm working on that...

Norman's Weather Report



December was very mild at Ebford, as throughout our region, and amazingly dry here for 13 days before Christmas. However, before and after this period rainfall total was 97 mm (3.8 inches); almost half of which fell during the four holidays of Christmas! The previous ten-year average was 98 mm. The annual amount for 2021 was 919 mm (36.2 inches) with considerable monthly variations to recall: May 177, October 169, April 16,

November 15 mm. The average annual rainfall here at Ebford between 2017 and 2021 was 897 mm (35.3 inches). I should like to point out that this is 17.3 per cent greater than the average annual value between 2001 and 2010 of 765 mm (30.1 inches). Norman Cann


