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MESSAGE FROM THE VICARAGE



I thought I ought to write something about illness and disability, as I am suffering from another bout of ME-related conditions at the time of writing. I was also prompted by something I heard on Radio 4 last Sunday: the speaker, who had lived in Bristol, was lamenting the thoughtlessness of some people, who parked across the kerb; making it difficult for her elderly mother to navigate the pavement with her

new mobility-assisted 'wheels' that she was pushing. The interesting point was that the speaker hadn't ever noticed it before her mother had to use her wheels.

In Woodbury, people can also be thoughtless with their parking but so can I when in a hurry, or simply when not thinking. We all need to be aware of others' disability, including that which we cannot see. During my illness I have been unable to walk even small distances (including, notably, the tiny distance between my house and St Swithun's in Woodbury) and have even considered applying for a temporary disabled parking sticker (the bureaucracy has put me off). How much have I taken for granted the ability to just walk anywhere I wanted; quite necessary in our small flat in Lyme Regis, where car parking is at a huge premium?

Of course, we can play on our disability; we have all heard stories of people taking disability car parking liberties. Jesus, I suppose, had something to say in his time about people with illnesses; more than once he asked: 'Do you want to be healed?', or 'What do you want me to do for you?' Some Bible commentators have suggested that to be healed could require a lifestyle change – if your income was from begging outside the temple, what would you do if your disability suddenly disappeared?

If I had more room in this article, I could write about resurrection, our new resurrection bodies, and the debate about what that would be like for those whose earthly bodies are in some way incomplete.

To finish where I started, finding out you are ill is in many ways a revelation, particularly for me with it being a 'syndrome' or 'condition'. It is definitely 'disabling', and has, I hope, enabled me to think a little more, and even empathise with more, of those whose lives are much more affected than mine. Help me to help others Lord, whatever my condition. Amen.

PS My thanks to one or two readers who have given me email thanks for my monthly thoughts. They are not always easy to write, I often crib others, but if I have caused some of you occasionally to ponder or even pray a little, I am grateful.

Bishops Clyst Parish Council



Annual Parish Meeting. The Annual Parish Meeting will be held in Clyst St Mary Church on Wednesday 13th April at 7 pm and will be followed by the normal monthly Parish Council meeting. The Annual Parish Meeting is, in legal terms, a quite

separate body from the Parish Council, but it is the Council that arranges it, simply because it is unlikely that anyone else will do so. Its decisions are not binding on the Council, though the Council will normally take heed of what is said at the meeting.

The Annual Parish Meeting is a legacy from the Middle Ages, when local councils did not exist, and all local decision making was carried out by meetings of the whole community, taking place in the church vestry. It is open to all electors of the Parish, who have the right not only to attend but also to speak on any matter of local interest. This contrasts with a Council meeting, where electors who are not Councillors have no automatic right to speak, though there is an item on every Parish Council agenda when electors can raise matters of concern to them.

This meeting has its own minutes, which are kept separately from the Council minutes, and these minutes can only be approved by the next Annual Parish Meeting which will, of course, not be held until the following year. The draft minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting are reported to the next convenient meeting of the Council, since otherwise matters are unlikely to get progressed. But the Council cannot approve these minutes, as they do not belong to the Council.

If you have any matter of local interest or concern which you wish to raise, please let the Clerk know and come along to the Annual Parish Meeting, or just come along if you would like to find out more about the issues affecting your parish.

Community Grants. Community grants of up to £500 are available to groups, clubs and voluntary organisations based in the Parish for non-commercial activities which benefit residents of the Parish. Please see further details on our website (www.bishopsclyst.org.uk/community-grants/).



Norman's Weather Report



A very 'dry January', in terms of rainfall, was imposed upon us by the wobbly vagaries of the Jet Stream north of Britain. This flows at great speed from west to east in our upper atmosphere and seems to dictate our weather continuously.

The amount of rain was only 23 mm (0.9 inch) and it fell almost entirely during the first ten days of the month; later days were either dry and quite cold or mild and also surprisingly dry. The 20-year average amount for January here at Ebford has been 83 mm (3.28 inches). The average over the last seven years, 2015 - 2021, is 80 mm. Things will change when spring appears! Norman Cann

Woodbury Salterton C of E Primary School

Another month and more news to share with you from Woodbury Salterton C of E Primary School.

We are proud to announce that we achieved Bronze Award status in Christian Aid's *Global Neighbours*. This scheme was launched in partnership with the Church of England's



Education Office with a vision of helping young people understand more about the inequalities in this world and helping them to become courageous advocates for those who have no voice. The accreditation scheme celebrates schools that are helping pupils learn about global poverty

and the Christian responsibility.

We have also won a Silver Carnegie Mental Health Award! All five of the schools in our federation have been awarded this in recognition of the focus we give to supporting pupil, parent and staff mental health and wellbeing. This has been particularly important throughout the pandemic.



This half term's value is COURAGE. During our collective worships we will be exploring what it means to be courageous and listening to Bible stories such as the story of Moses and Esther that show how people have been brave and shown acts of courage. Our words of wisdom from the Bible are: 'Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go.' Joshua 1.9

Class 1 have had a busy few weeks. They designed and made their own sandwiches and then learned how to write down the instructions. They have begun a new unit about 'How to Hide a Lion at School' and loved exploring the new text; thinking about different verbs they could use to make their writing more interesting. They went on a walk up to forest school with their cuddly toys and found some hiding spots ready to write their own version of 'How to Hide a Toy at Forest School'! The children have come up with some great ideas for where they could hide their toys and how their toys are going to save the day. In science, they have loved exploring our bodies and the things that our bodies can do. They experimented with their senses and had a go at tasting, smelling, listening, looking at and touching things. Some children weren't so keen on tasting the pepper but loved tasting the strawberry.

Class 2 have been really excited about their new theme of Rocks, Relics and Rumbles and have been researching how volcanoes are formed, as well as looking at and comparing different types of rocks. Some of the children have brought in fossils that they found locally; it has been fascinating to find out about some of the animal remains they show. As part of their RE unit on Judaism, Jane, a visitor, came to school and talked to Class 2 and 3 about their faith. The children in Class 2 learned about the beliefs and customs that are important to Jewish people. This included the special hats that Jewish men wear called Kippah, as well as lots of things that are done to prepare and celebrate Shabbat - such as cleaning their house, cooking food and lighting candles. In DT this term the children are making sand carriers to help Class 1 move the sand tray in their outside area. This has included research into types of buckets and containers, testing various materials to see which would be the most suitable and making their own containers. The children decided that plastic would be the best material to use and are collecting recyclable and unwanted plastic pots to make their containers. In literacy the children have been re-telling fairy tales using adverbs to show time passing, such as 'a little while later', and 'after that'. They are then planning on re-writing a fairy tale and changing the ending of it. In maths they have been learning how to multiply and divide numbers, using strategies such as grouping, sharing and using times table facts.

Class 3 have been working incredibly hard on their learning and making great progress with Times Tables Rockstars. Class 3 also have two 'Word Millionaires'; Megan and Olivia have read over 1 million words since starting Class 3 in September 2021. This is a fantastic achievement and their photo is displayed in our Word Millionaire corner in the school library to encourage other young readers. During our RE lessons Class 3 welcomed Jane to school to talk about her faith and show us many different Jewish artefacts. The children learnt some Jewish songs, performed a Jewish dance and had a taste of some Challah bread. Class 3 also had an engaging and thoughtful afternoon at the LIFE exhibition run by the ICE team at the Belmont Chapel. The workshop taught them all about the life of Jesus and gave them an opportunity to reflect on what they believe and think about the life of Jesus.

Due to our nursery numbers growing rapidly, we have increased the sessions that we are able to offer and are now open every weekday. I am humbled by the friendship and support shown to me by the residents


of the village and the surrounding area. A heartfelt thank you to all friends and neighbours who have helped in so many ways.

Re My Cover Photo



I think this is a very cleverly crafted piece of functional and commemorative artwork. Gone are the normal deterrent spikes to be replaced by the spears of the combatants on that day in 1549. In addition to the date are the emblems of the commanders on the two shields - the lion and Fleur de Lys on the attacking royalist side to the right and what I assume is the heraldic martlet (although figured more like the wren in German heraldry than the usual

swallow-like bird) which is prominent on Humphrey Arundel's coat of arms defending on the left.

I remember closing my walk 'In the Footsteps of the Rebels' with a comment that, apart from a brief mention on the Environment Agency board at the far end of the Old Bridge, there is no memorial to those who fought on either side for what they believed to be right. Perhaps now there is.

Oh yes! This visitor so modest Will always be so welcome, and full grown Will nod their silent bells in thanks. ©John Smith




AND FINALLY...

St Swithun's Church Woodbury East Window by Kempe Studios



In 1893 the children of William and Mary Sanders approached the Rector at St Swithun's, Rev'd John Loveband Fulford, to ask permission to install this unique window in honour of their parents, who were related to the Rector by marriage. The Rector's son Robert Medley Fulford was the architect of the restoration of St Swithun's in the 1890s. In the 1841 census William Sanders was living with his wife and children at Gilbrook in Woodbury, and a tanner by trade. You can still see the water channel beside the house. Both William and his nephew (by marriage) the Rector were High Church Anglicans. The well-known glazier Charles Eamer Kempe (1837 - 1907) was approached to provide the window. We can recognise his style as the wings of the angels have peacock feathers. Their garments are pearlised, and during Kempe's lifetime the wheatsheaf 'signature' is used.

Adrian Barlow is a recognised authority on the life and works of Kempe and writes: 'At first glance the window seems to represent the Crucifixion of Christ, but in fact the scene depicts the celebration of the Roman Mass. The words on the open Missal ("Te igitur clementissme Pater...") are the opening words of the first prayer in the Canon of the Mass; the text "O salutaris hostia" are the opening words of a Gregorian hymn and up in the tracery

the words surrounding the chalice "Sanguis Xti lava nos" (Blood of Christ, wash us) - are apparently a confusion on Kempe's part of two different lines from the C14 hymn "Anima Christi" which contains the following lines: "Sanguis Christi, inebria me; Aqua lateris Christi, lava me." Actually, Kempe knew the correct words perfectly well as they appear in a window of 1884 in St Mary's Church, Monmouth.

'The miniature Christ on the crucifix is interesting because on his head he has both the crown of thorns and another crown which is actually (and uniquely as far as I'm aware) a crown apparently composed of fruit and leaves. Although his body shows five wounds with blood flowing, this is an image of Christ in Majesty being adored by the angels, two of whom are also censing the altar on which the Mass is about to be celebrated.'

Adrian concludes, 'The whole window (undoubtedly designed by John Lisle but right at the start of his time as Chief Draughtsman to the Kempe Studios) leaves me almost speechless!' I'm grateful to Adrian Barlow for his interpretation of the window, William Finnigan for the photo of the window, David Kemp and Gillian Selley on the history of the window and village. In view of the unique design, the window deserves some specialist care. Stuart Bird

The roof of the shed was damaged in the gales but my kind neighbour gave me a waterproof cover to use until I could repair it. Ta Pauline.

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


