

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
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
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MESSAGE FROM THE VICARAGE **Spiritual Pain**



I learnt a new phrase the other day, which seems appropriate in a (post-)pandemic age: it is 'spiritual pain'. I had, of course, known about it before, I'd just not used that name for it. It seems appropriate too for those of us who are accompanying those who have terminal

I went on an excellent Zoom course run by Sarum College in the cathedral close in Salisbury – worth a visit. On the course were various people engaged in caring from a Christian perspective. In my small group everyone was either supporting someone who was dving, or had had a close brush with death themselves.

This spiritual pain affects old and young alike - one example was of a ten-year-old whose father was rushed into hospital with Covid, who couldn't see him. The whole family regularly attended church, but the mother couldn't answer the question as to why this was happening; all she could do was to hold her child.

We talked briefly about the age-old problem as to why God allows pain and suffering. The seminar leader quoted C S Lewis, who said this about pain: 'We can ignore even pleasure. But pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world.' (Pleasure of Pain, 1940) Not all will find this quotation helpful: I read it to my mother who wasn't sure about it. It speaks to me, however, as one who has a low pain threshold.

CS Lewis, like us responding to the crisis in Ukraine, would have known what the effect of war had on people, but he could see beyond the simple resource of blame – to blame either the aggressors in war, or the creator God. A response, which notably is not an answer, is found in the Psalms and in the book of Job. It is that of 'lament'. It might be helpful for us to rediscover the act of lamenting. One way to do this is to try and write our own psalm, crying out to God. Don't restrict your language(!); the original psalmist didn't – 'Why are you letting this happen, God?', for example.

I'm going to finish this article by quoting a powerful story of an Anglican priest I once knew, whose young son, aged about two, had been wrongly diagnosed with a terminal illness, but he didn't yet know that the diagnosis was wrong. He tried asking God why, but got nowhere in his prayers. Then once, when out on a walk, he swore at God: 'Why the whatever are you allowing this to happen?' After that, he felt that he was at least being real in his conversation with God. I can't recommend the swearing; but I can one hundred percent endorse being real before God in our prayers.

So, if you believe in God, or even in a powerful force out there somewhere, even if you struggle to pray - try to be real, and shout out to our God, even in pain. The answer might not be what we want, or in the timescale we want; but rest assured, God hears. Amen.

It's difficult to comprehend what is happening to our peace-loving European neighbours in Ukraine. One moment life for them is rolling along in its normal, unassuming way; the next, families are being relentlessly and terrifyingly bombed from the skies and on the ground, forced to leave their menfolk behind, pack a few essentials and take to the road seeking some sort of way out of the horror. Unimaginable. (I expect many of you have tried to envisage how we would cope should the UK suddenly be faced with a similar invasion...What's that absolutely essential item that would have to go with you, no matter what?)

Sadly, Ukraine is not the only country that has been plunged into the terrors of war in recent years as a result of the deranged bloodthirsty ambitions of dictators and extremist groups and governments. Let's not forget Syria, Afghanistan, Yemen, the Rohingya people of Myanmar — to name but a few. The resulting refugee crisis has affected us all. Of course, Ukraine seems so much closer to home but, at the end of the day, all the victims from around the world are human beings, like us. They need understanding and kindness in their hour of need. And, thank the Lord, in times of adversity the human spirit comes to the rescue. The response from ordinary people in so many countries, including our own, to offer a welcoming hand to so many people finding themselves homeless and stateless, has been generous and humbling. (As of today, over 130,000 Brits have offered temporary homes to Ukrainian refugees.) Let's keep hold of that and, like with the onset of spring, look to a time of hope, optimism and new beginnings in the months and years to come.

Have a very Happy Easter. Enjoy the magazine. I hope to be back at CVN Towers by the time the next issue goes to press. Fingers crossed! Best wishes. Peter Skelton



The Battle of Clyst St Mary - Now Remembered



If you have recently walked or cycled across the old bridge you cannot have failed to notice the new metal device on the flood wall to deter access to would-be explorers. But this artwork has a dual purpose -- it is also a long due remembrance of those who fought here in the summer of 1549 during the Prayerbook Rebellion. What follows is a short account of those events in the village. (If you want the full, but somewhat biased account,

as written at the time by Exeter theologian Richard Hooker, you can find it in his 'The Ancient History and Description of the City of Exeter'. Search in Google Books. The section relating to Clyst St Mary begins on page 41.)

But first, some brief background history: Henry VIII, when the Pope would not annul his marriage to Catherine of Aragon, broke the English Catholic Church from the control of Rome and styled himself Head of the Church in England. As Henry still considered himself to be a good Catholic this action really didn't change the church services very much. But his young son, Edward, was greatly influenced by his Protestant advisors. Sweeping changes were made within the church, including the introduction of a new prayer book to be used exclusively in all services. This was not liked by many in the conservative south-west. In Devon the first rebellious action was in Sampford Courtenay but in Clyst St Mary there was a very specific ignition point. Richard Hooker relates that incident in Church Lane involving Walter Raleigh, father of the illustrious Elizabethan seafarer:

Walter was on his way to Exeter from his home nearby when he passed an old woman going towards the parish church with rosary beads [a very Catholic object] in her hand. He warned her that she would be punished if she showed disrespect for the religious reforms that were now enshrined in law. The old woman, not well understanding the matter, as soon as she came to the parish church began to make a great stir saying that she was threatened by the gentleman that, unless she would leave her beads, her house and all their houses would be burnt. She had no sooner spoken than she was believed; and in all haste the parishioners flung out of the church and began to dig trenches.' The ditch and rampart they dug would have run from the Grindle Brook to the main road, roughly following the line of Clyst Valley Road then across to Bishops Court Lane.

Obviously the powers-that-be, whose royalist army had already fought a battle with a rebel group at Fenny Bridges, were not going to take this new insurrection lying down. Hooker takes up the story: 'Accordingly, on Saturday 3rd August, he [Lord Russell, who commanded the royal forces – hence the lion and Fleur de Lys on the right shield of the bridge artwork] set out from Honiton, and marched in good order, towards Exeter; but leaving the direct high road, he came over the down towards Woodbury, and there pitched his camp that night by a windmill [sited on the hill near Greendale]. When the rebels of St Mary Clyst heard thereof, they forthwith assembled all their force, and marched forward. They came to the aforesaid mill, where they gave battle; and notwithstanding they fought most valiantly, at length they were defeated, and a great number of them slain.' They retreated back behind their barricade where they were joined by part of the rebel army from Cornwall commanded by Lord Arundell

(whose heraldic martlet emblem appears on the left shield).


'On Sunday, Russell pushed forward, and the army entered the village. His Lordship was inform'd that every house therein was fortified, and full of men. Upon this, order was given to set fire thereto.' It is said that no building in Clyst St Mary was not destroyed

by fire. Hooker goes on: 'But the rebels, who now assembled themselves in the middle of the village stood upon their defence; when a very fierce, cruel, and bloody fight began so that there fell that day about a thousand of these obstinate and foolish men.'

With Russell's army in control of the village, 'the surviving rebels made good their escape onto the bridge which was blocked with felled trees and defended by a cannon, taken from a ship at Topsham, which was manned by a solitary qunner.' Blocking the bridge would have been easier then than now as it was originally only about two-thirds its present width. Hooker continues: 'Nevertheless, it was necessary to clear the bridge to allow the infantry to cross. Proclamation was now made, that whoever should pass first over the bridge, should have 400 crowns as a reward. Immediately hereupon one of the company, more respecting the gain than forecasting the peril, gave the adventure; but the gunner, discharging his piece, slew him.'

But the River Clyst could be forded upstream (near where Mill House now stands), and this proved crucial to the outcome of the battle: 'Lord Grey desired to get over the river to be in the open fields of Clyst Heath, but the river was very deep by reason of the flowing off the sea. Nevertheless one John Yarde, a local man, led them up a lane [Frog Lane] and passed over the river near unto a mill above the bridge and others followed. But before he [the gunner] could again charge his piece, one of the company who before had passed over the water, entered the bridge at the farther end, and, coming behind him, slew him; and the timber and trees then removed, the whole army passed over the bridge to the heath [Clyst Heath].' It was all over for the men of Clyst St Mary. Those taken prisoner were taken to Clyst Heath (now just the small wooded area by the side of the Chiefs Ground). Here, for fear of a counter-attack by those who had escaped, Russell had their throats cut – a violent action even in Tudor times! There was a failed counter attack where the rebels: "... fought most stoutly, nor would give out

as long as life and limb lasted; so that few or none were left alive. Great was the slaughter, and cruel was the fight; and such was the valour of these men, that the Lord Grey declared, that he never, in all the wars that he had been, knew the like.' What more is said by Hooker of Clyst St. Mary? Nothing. With the village burnt to the ground and the male population slain what else was there to be said? Ironically within four years Edward was dead, to be succeeded by his half-sister Mary, a devout Catholic, who reinstated the old church services!



So were the inhabitants the rebels they were proclaimed to be by the State - or the heroic but failed revolutionaries they set out to be? Hooker's 'obstinate and foolish men'; or men that the Lord Grey 'noted for their valour that he never knew the like'? That I leave to you. Clyde Bish

Norman's Weather Report



Rainfall at Ebford for the month only amounted to 45 mm (1.8 inches), definitely not heavy nor liable to fill 'dykes' and reservoirs. This was very much in contrast to other parts of the country, where the attention of storms Dudley, Eunice and Franklin

produced much wind damage and floods. Our local situation, sheltered by Dartmoor and the Haldon hills, tends to keep us on the dry side.

In terms of averages, that for between 2011 and 2020 was 74 mm and the local average here at Ebford over the last five years is 71 mm. (However, there was a recent exceptional February in 2020 when 156 mm (6.1 inches) was recorded her in Ebford.) Norman Cann

Class Two Update. Class Two have been continuing their theme of Rocks, Relics and Rumbles and have been learning about Mary Anning. Music has been very exciting this month as we have been reading, writing and performing using our own graphic scores. We started by listening to the sounds of a volcano and then experimented by making our own. As part of our RE unit on Judaism, we have been learning what 'repentance' means and the times that Jewish people ask for forgiveness. We thought of our own 'sorry' messages for something we have said or done and wrote these on to cardboard boats to float away. It was Mental Wellbeing Week this month so we have been doing extra mental health activities to remind us how to keep our bodies and minds healthy. Some of our activities including sending each other compliments, writing thank you messages and doing some yoga.

Class Three Update. Class Three have enjoyed designing and making their own pieces of wallpaper in the style of William Morris. The children have also created some fantastic pieces of art in the style of Andy Goldsworthy whilst at forest school. It was lovely to watch the children work in small teams to create these natural masterpieces. During our mental health sessions,

we have been learning how important it is to have a growth mindset rather than a fixed mindset. We put all this learning into practice during one forest school session where the whole class worked together to solve a problem that involved transporting a ball and then water across the field using only some pieces of guttering.

Collective Worship. This half term's value is FORGIVENESS. During our collective worships we will be exploring what it means to forgive and listening to Bible stories such as "The Prodigal Son' and "The Unforgiving Servant".

Being a school governor is an exciting opportunity to make a very worthwhile contribution to your local community. The duties of a governor are not onerous, but do require commitment and a willingness to take an active role in supporting the work of each of our five schools. The Governors of the Jubilee with Pebblebed Federation are responsible for the Church of England primary schools at Broadhembury, Branscombe, Farway, Littleham and **Woodbury Salterton**. Lasting Powers of Attorney and Why They Are So Important



Often when I ask someone if they know anything about *Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs)*, I'm usually met with either some uncertainty or a straight up 'no'. It's a fact that public awareness is very low and this isn't helped by a few misconceptions. But LPAs are incredibly important documents to have in place and they provide you and your family with ultimate protection and control.

An LPA is a legal document which enables you to appoint people you implicitly trust (called attorneys) to act on your behalf for any property and financial and/or health and welfare decisions. Your attorneys can be family, friends or a professional (eg will writer or solicitor).

There are two LPAs to consider: **1) Property and Financial Affairs** You can choose to activate this LPA straightaway when you are fit and healthy, if you perhaps need some help with your finances or property. Or you can activate it only if you lose your mental capacity.

2) Health and Welfare It can only be activated if you lose your mental capacity.

If you lost your mental capacity (temporarily or permanently), your LPAs would allow your attorneys (people you trust) to look after you and your assets. Attorneys must adhere to any instructions (legally binding) and do their best to accommodate any preferences (not legally binding). Your attorneys must always act in your best interests and make decisions based on how you would think, rather than how they themselves would react.

'LPAs don't apply to me.' The following misconceptions might change your mind...

I only need to think about LPAs when I'm much older. It's a sobering statistic, but every 90 seconds there's a hospital admission with an acquired brain injury (source: www.headway.org.uk).

I'll sort out my LPAs if I get to a point where I really need them. Leaving it until you have a problem can be leaving it too late. And if you've lost your mental capacity, then an application has to go through the Courts, which takes time (months) and can be very expensive.

If anything happens to me, my spouse/civil partner can sort everything out. I'm afraid joint bank accounts can be frozen without a Property and Financial Affairs LPA.

If I'm seriously ill, my next of kin will make the final decisions regarding my treatment. Unfortunately, your next of kin have no legal rights to make any decisions for you without a Health and Welfare LPA in place.

I would always advise that you use an LPA specialist/will writer/solicitor to take your instructions and register your LPAs. But there is no legal requirement for you to do so and you are perfectly entitled to complete and register the LPA forms yourself. However, to avoid your application being rejected by the Office of the Public Guardian (OPG), you will need to take the time to understand what you can and can't do when completing the forms. It takes very little for the OPG to reject applications, which results in having to reapply and pay another fee (albeit most likely a reduced fee).

So what are the fees? Well, the standard OPG fee is currently £82 per form. For anyone on an annual income of less than £12K per year or in receipt of certain benefits, a reduced fee of £41 per form (or in some cases no fee) can apply. If you use an LPA specialist/will writer/solicitor, their fees are separate and in addition to the OPG fees.


