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EDITOR'S NOTE



Hello and welcome to this April edition of the Clyst Valley News. Change is in the air – not only with the weather, hopefully (spring has now officially sprung); but also closer to home, at the CVN. Astute readers may have already noticed a few differences (improvements?) in the layout and appearance of the magazine this month. This is the beginning of a sort of overhaul of the CVN

designed to create a more entertaining, informative and attractive monthly magazine, firmly rooted in our communities; and provide better advertising and sponsorship options for local businesses. A bit of background:

Readers may be aware that we have been having some issues recently with securing sponsorship and advertising which have threatened the future of our magazine. This has given us pause for thought. Apart from the move to professional printing in 2012, the format of the CVN has remained essentially the same, although I have made efforts since I took over as editor in 2010 to give a growing emphasis to its role as a vehicle for broad-based community news and information. If we are to secure and develop its future (and be able to continue to run it on an entirely voluntary basis and deliver it free to readers), we are going to have to start to move in a new direction.

Technically, the Clyst St Mary Church PCC is the 'owner' of the CVN and this has meant that, of course, church-related matters (and specifically, the White Cross Mission Community have been given pride of place in the magazine. Following a recent meeting of interested PCC members, Rev'd Bill Lemmey and myself, it was agreed that the CVN will now move away from that dependent arrangement and evolve into a more clearly defined, free-standing, community-based magazine, possibly established as a charitable trust. Please do see Bill's comments on this in the new WCMC section.

At the same time, to improve overall quality, I need, as editor, to shift from doing all the production to focusing on content and design; and take on a small team of volunteers to lead on advertising, news gathering, sponsorship and distribution. In addition, I want to extend the scope of the CVN to include a wider range of regular columnists and feature articles.

In case what I am saying may be sounding alarm bells amongst those of you with strong ties to your local churches, let me reassure you straightaway that church news from all our villages will continue to be welcome and feature in the magazine, including the WCMC service timetable and a monthly message from our vicar.

Let me stress that these changes are not going to happen overnight. They will be gradually introduced over the coming months and readers will see continuing changes in style, layout and content as we move forward.

So I am starting the search now for people interested in the following **voluntary** roles:

- Securing advertising and sponsorship.
- Building an online presence for the CVN.
- News gathering in our villages and towns (to complement our dedicated existing cadre of supporters providing valuable content every month).
- Delivery to households and businesses in our area, where required.
- Writing more regular columns and features, eg local groups and societies, hobbyists, 'book of the month', new music, food and cookery, environment, travel, etc, etc.

If any of this takes your fancy, do please get in touch with me and we can have a chat. I'd be delighted to hear from you. Just drop me a line at <u>clystvalleynews@gmail.com</u> to get the ball rolling. Thank you.

Finally, as a start for the new-look CVN, I hope you like our new cover title. The photographer responsible for the fantastic banner photo of the confluence of the Clyst and Exe Rivers, Paula Fernley, has very kindly given us permission to use it and I'd like to record our sincere thanks and appreciation to her. Bishops Clyst Parish Council



Annual Parish Meeting. The Annual Parish Meeting will be held in Clyst St Mary Church on Wednesday 5th April, 2023 at 7 pm and will be followed by the normal monthly Parish Council meeting. The Annual Parish Meeting is, in legal terms, a quite

separate body from the Parish Council, but it is the Council that arranges it, simply because it is unlikely that anyone else will do so. Its decisions are not binding on the Council, though the Council will normally take heed of what is said at the meeting.

The Annual Parish Meeting is a legacy from the Middle Ages, when local councils did not exist, and all local decision making was carried out by meetings of the whole community, taking place in the church vestry. It is open to all electors of the parish, who have the right not only to attend but also to speak on any matter of local interest. This contrasts with a Council meeting, where electors who are not Councillors have no automatic right to speak, though there is an item on every parish council agenda when electors can raise matters of concern to them.

This meeting has its own minutes, which are kept separately from the Council minutes, and these minutes can only be approved by the next Annual Parish Meeting which will, of course, not be held until the following year. The draft minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting are reported to the next convenient meeting of the Council, since otherwise matters are unlikely to get progressed. But the Council cannot approve these minutes, as they do not belong to the Council.

If you have any matter of local interest or concern which you wish to raise, please let the Clerk know and come along to the Annual Parish Meeting, or just come along if you would like to find out more about the issues affecting your parish.

Clyst Valley AFC – The Cobras



As many of you will know Clyst Valley AFC is over 130 years old but their junior section, the Cobras, is just approaching its second birthday. A lot of interest has been created in the Cobras and I have been asked to provide more information which I am doing now.

Following an approach from some parents nearly two years ago Clyst Valley agreed to support them in creating a junior section for younger children of both sexes to take an active interest in sport and general physical activity. With the support of Bishops Clyst Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee we were able to base the first teams at the Village Hall field utilising the levelled football area and hence the Cobras were born. In September 2021 the Cobras were able to form two teams for Under 7s and in September 2022 they moved up to Under 8s and two new Under 7s teams were added. We now have nearly 36 young players within the four teams all of whom play and train at the Village Hall field on Saturday mornings. In September all the teams will move up another age group and I am pleased to advise that following a recent agreement with Burrington Estates, the Under 9s will be based at the Winslade Manor recreation ground thereby providing continuity for the children.

The Cobras have proved to be extremely popular and successful so far and I would like to thank the Parish Council, the Village Hall committee and now also Burrington Estates for their support and belief in Clyst Valley's ability to deliver. I would also like to thank our sponsors, the support shown by so many parents and in particular those parents that have, with Clyst Valley's help, become qualified FA coaches.

Message from the Vicarage



On the Sunday before Mothering Sunday I preached a sermon based upon an encounter that Jesus had with a Samaritan woman at a well. It fitted well with being shortly after International Woman's Day. Jesus' male disciples were shocked to see him speaking with a woman, a Samaritan too. They didn't understand that it was for precisely those who didn't easily fit in that

Jesus came. He overturned the religious niceties of the day with a more compassionate concern for the outsider.

The other day I was part of a group meeting, looking at the funding and composition of this magazine. You will see from Peter Skelton's editorial this month that we are moving away from the 'church' owning the magazine towards having a more community-based magazine. Peter has made it clear that we are still hoping to keep delivering the CVN free to all the local households, and that we continue to need a varied content for the magazine.

I have always tried to keep the vicar's letter as 'broadly' interesting as possible, and hope that this, together with the announcement of church services and events, reflects the church being part of the local community. In other words, it is no longer what it perhaps once was – a church magazine. And I think this is a good thing. However, like most of us, I want to have my cake and eat it (a peculiar expression which I have heard explained sensibly, but for another time). So I will continue trying to throw in the occasional religious ball from the left field, to keep us on our theological toes! Perhaps I should try and avoid too many mixed metaphors, though.

It is far too easy for those of us involved in running churches to be inward-looking and only concerned with our own congregations. I often quote a previous Archbishop (and forgive me if you have heard this before), William Temple, who famously said: 'The Church is the only society on earth that exists for the benefit of non-members.'

Saying, or speaking, these words is, however, quite different from putting them into practice. So let's hope that the new look to the CVN will reflect the needs of all our community, not just the minority of churchgoing ones. Having nailed my colours to the mast (yet another metaphor), I do however want to echo Peter's thanks for all who keep the CVN going, including the volunteer deliverers, many of whom are linked to our churches. Let's hang on in there (Peter's metaphor this time) and see the CVN go from strength to strength.

I was honoured to be asked if the Clyst Valley News could use my panorama of the area. I'm a local photographer in East Devon. My love of photography began when I was a child. I started with a terrible

Kodak Instamatic that only seemed to take blurred photos; it was too light for a small girl to hold steady, and it moved every time I squeezed the shutter button. I moved into 35 mm compacts then graduated to film and digital SLRs before progressing to a Fuji mirrorless system. I have now discovered a new photography love and that is flying my camera drone. This

is quite amusing as two weeks before I bought this I was heard to say, 'I don't like drones, I can't see the point of them and I don't want one.' Oh my, have I had to eat my words.

With the advent of the pandemic I had to mothball my portrait business. This was difficult in many ways but this has allowed me to get out into the wilds again and have fun taking photographs. Landscaping has always been my first love, and it's nice to revisit.

The scope for aerial stills photography and videography is immense. When work began again I have been able to use the drone for portraits of people celebrating their lives and

homes. The pandemic made people re-evaluate what's important to them and photographs of your families are so important. For me drone photography is all about seeing life from a different perspective, seeing things you haven't seen before and things you have, but from another angle. It has opened my eyes to my local area to record it in a very different way. evolving landscape. although this is complicated by the presence of a local airport. As well as much beauty around my local area, there is a lot of house building going on. The landscape is changing dramatically and irreversibly. The drone is a great tool to capture the Air Traffic Control need to be consulted to make sure they are happy for me to fly doing this work. The last thing I want is to endanger anybody or anything.

We had a situation last year where I was teaching someone to fly their drone on a disused airfield. We had sought permission and it had been granted. So off we went for a lesson. No sooner had we got the drone in the air and we looked to our right, we could see an enormous Hercules transport aircraft

You need to keep your wits

about you and have eyes in the back of your head. Having someone else with you to spot is a great idea too. Luckily we were only about 20 metres off the ground and nowhere near the Hercules but it made the heart pound for a minute or two about what might have been.

It's tough on the fingers flying in frosty conditions but the patterns revealed in the landscape are worth it. I know many people that have bought an expensive camera drone then left it in the box for months as they are too scared to get it out and fly it. Trying to find anywhere to fly seems impossible. My advice would be to book some training to gain confidence and do a qualification so you know the rules.

Here I have included a selection of my favourite images. The freedom to get unseen views from familiar locations is tremendous and has really ignited my passion for photography again. The cover image is only a few miles from my home but with no high vantage points around I have only seen it a few times going off on holiday in an aeroplane.

The Sky Tonight: April



I hope you were able to catch sight of the conjunction of Venus and Jupiter at the beginning of last month and of the Space Station on one of its late March passes. If not, there is a phone app *Heavens Above* which lists all the satellites passes, not only the ISS, each night. You might like to give it a try.

Spring is with us and with it, the stars that fill the spring sky. Looking at the southern sky in the middle of this month at our usual time of about 9 pm, it is

obvious that the aspect now is very different from what it was when we started in January. The orange star Aldebaran, which was then due south has been replaced by a different, bluewhite star, Regulus, in our constellation of the month, Leo, the lion. The reason for the change is that the time it takes our Earth to turn once on its axis is not 24 hours, but 23 hours, 56 minutes and 11 seconds. So if you look out in the same direction at the same time the following night the Earth is already into its next revolution by about four minutes, moving the stars across the sky by a little under one degree. These add up, changing the aspect of the sky season by season. (We'll come back to this 'clock time' vs 'star time' discrepancy in a later article.)

Turning back now to the night sky and our constellation of the month, Leo, you will see five less bright stars forming with Regulus a reversed question mark or sickle shape. This is the head of the lion. Look at the second star in the sickle above Regulus with binoculars. It is a splendid binary star with orange and yellow components. Leo is a large constellation so looking well to the left of the sickle you will find two further stars making with it a rectangle the body of the lion. Under the lower of these are two spiral galaxies, M65 and M66. One further star forms a triangle at the end, the lion's hindquarters. This last star is named Denebola, Arabic for 'base of the tail'.

Two further constellations, either side of Leo, are associated with him. If you sweep the sky with binoculars to the left of the constellation, continuing a line from Regulus to Denebola you will find a sprinkling of faint stars and a cluster of fuzzy patches. The latter are galaxies far beyond our own galaxy, the Milky Way. These form the constellation Berenice's Hair, Coma Berenice. The lady in question was an Egyptian queen who, when her husband returned safely from war, cut off her beautiful hair and laid it on the temple altar. Unfortunately it disappeared The king was about to execute everyone in sight when a quick-thinking priest pointed to this

hazy patch in the sky, saying the gods had honoured his wife's sacrifice, placing her shining tresses in the sky - or so the story goes!

To the right of Leo, on a line between Regulus and the stars Castor and Pollux we met last time is the constellation of Cancer, the Crab. Look for quite a small triangle of three 4th magnitude (ie quite faint) stars with a fourth one in the centre. So, not an impressive constellation in comparison with, say Orion. However, it is of note for two reasons: You may recall on a map of the world, above the Equator a line labelled Tropic of Cancer, so named because when, on 21st June, the summer solstice, the Sun attains its highest mid-day elevation for the year it would be 'in' this constellation, ie if you could see them, the stars of this constellation would appear behind the Sun. (More about this in a later article.) The second claim we can observe now. Look just above the star in the middle of the triangle and you will see probably the night sky's finest open cluster of stars. With binoculars it is spectacular, with over 200 stars spread over three full-moon widths. This cluster, called the Beehive, is one of the closest to Earth.

Turning our attention to the planets, the 11th of this month is the best time to see the planet Mercury. **Please wait until the Sun has completely set** then scan the sky with binoculars about one third of the way between that setting point and the planet Venus which is very obvious in the West. Mercury is small (only slightly larger than our Moon) and the disc will only be about three-quarters lit, the inner planets showing phases like our Moon. (Why this is I'll explain when we turn our attention to Venus later in the year.) Persevere. Viewing it is difficult. I've only seen it twice in 65 years of observing!

Finally, there is a meteor shower this month, the Lyrids. The shower is expected to peak on the night of $22^{nd}/23^{rd}$. Look to the East and you should see a meteor trail every two or three minutes. They are the consequence of the Earth passing through the debris left in the orbit of comet Thatcher - not named after Margaret but an amateur astronomer, A E Thatcher, who discovered it in 1831. (Prior to the days of automated telescopes most comets were discovered by amateurs. The American Edward Barnard discovered sixteen - and with a prize of \$200 a comet, offered at the time, it paid for his house!)
