

Clyst St Mary Church: Financial Crisis



We are currently facing a serious financial crisis at Clyst St Mary Church. Like everyone else, the church is not immune to rising costs. We need to increase our income to keep pace with inflation and we have had to carry out a number of major repairs in the last two years. We have just been advised that we must replace our oil tank at a cost of around £3000. We have very little money in the account and our annual budget is showing a deficit. Without a significant

increase in our income we may not be able to keep the church open.

If you value the church and, like us, want it to continue as part of our community life, would you be willing to support the church by regular giving as part of our Stewardship scheme? The regular giving, which others have undertaken to make as part of this scheme, covers a large part of the cost of maintenance of the church. If you are a taxpayer, we can benefit by 25 per cent on your payments from the taxman.

Walking Group




The village walk November will take place on Tuesday 21st. We are considering a walk in Stover

Councillors have arranged a meeting on site to review it with the residents of Model Cottages, and our revised plans will be submitted to EDDC in a planning application for change of use of the land.

At the October meeting we also decided to ask Devon CC to approve a diversion of Footpath 1 so it doesn't go through our 'Open Space'. Planning in Ebford does not look as though it will be determined by EDDC until the new year; they are short of staff at EDDC.

Norman's Weather Report



The first half of September was indeed very warm and dry and the second half from the 16th very wet; that weekend Ebford received 65 mm (2.6 inches) of at times very heavy rain with large puddles and local flooding. The blackberries ripened very well but they were washed away before they could be picked!

Total rainfall for the month was 105 mm (4.1 inches), very nearly the same as that for the recent wet July of 4.3 inches. This is way above historic averages for September here at Ebford; and also more than the average over the last ten years of 63 mm (2.5 inches). Norman Cann

Here at Woodbury Salterton Primary School, Forest School has been particularly exciting as everyone got the opportunity to use 'dragon sneezers' to make sparks and



then light cotton wool. Their excited faces were such a joy to see and they particularly loved digging in the mud, building dens, playing in the mud kitchen, and searching for bugs.

The Nursery and Reception children are taking part in lots of activities linked to harvest and autumn. Making clay hedgehogs has been lots of fun! In preparation for our Harvest Festival in church, we are learning a harvest song and making scarecrow puppets!

Class 1 were lucky to be invited to the art studio of local artist, Louise Kelly, who lives in the village and paints beautiful landscapes as well as fruit and potatoes! Louise was impressed with how polite and enthusiastic the children were and thoroughly enjoyed meeting them all and welcoming them to her garden studio. We hope to invite Louise into school to share her skills and talents with us.

In science Class 1 have been learning about how they can keep their bodies and minds healthy. They have thought about what makes a healthy diet and have looked at different types of exercise. This theme has been continued in their design and technology topic, as they have been thinking about healthy meals and different ways of preparing food. The children have enjoyed experimenting with different kitchen tools, deciding which tool is best to mash a banana, peel a potato, pick up lettuce and mix flour and water.

The Class 3 children have enjoyed finding out about Pablo Picasso and have been very creative in designing their own information page about him in their art sketch book. They loved creating a continuous line drawing and surprised themselves at how good their final drawings were! Over the next few weeks they will learn how to create depth and tone by using different shading techniques.

In their science lessons the Class 3 children have learnt about habitats and food chains and carefully considered how a change in the food change affects the food web. They have also researched the life cycles of plants, amphibians, mammals and insects. [Continued on page 11]

How Did Heavitree Get Its Name?



The origins of names are always of interest and, as lovers of trees, have you ever wondered how Heavitree acquired its name? There are two explanations and they are both possibly true, given the vast time lapse between them.

Many years ago an article by a local clergyman who had researched the issue (and whose name I regret to say I have forgotten) appeared in a local paper which suggested how Heavitree originally got its name. It was claimed that in Saxon times in the 6th century there was a local King Heffer who used to hold court beneath the canopy of a magnificent tree (I like to think it was a great oak). This tree gradually became known as 'Heffer's Tree' and over many hundreds of years until the Middle Ages, and given changing local dialects, it gradually merged into 'Heavitree'.

There is, however, a grimmer and more recent history which claims that the name derived from an old English word 'Heaford-treow' which means 'head tree'. This was where criminals were hanged and where others who had been beheaded had their heads hung up in the branches.

The last time it was used for this purpose was in 1682 when, sadly, three local women were hanged in the belief that they were practising witchcraft. These were the last reported hangings of witches in Britain. Let us all be thankful humanity has moved on. Tony Rule

The Sky Tonight: November



Last month, in our Saga in the Skies, we met up with Cepheus the king, Cassiopea his queen and our hero, Perseus – but I failed to mention that he arrived at the party on a flying horse, Pegasus. So let's start this month's journey across the heavens finding that constellation. At our usual observing time (about 10 pm, mid-month) find the W of Cassiopeia almost overhead. Follow the line from the centre star

through the adjacent one, moving in the direction of the SW horizon and at about halfway down you will find a large square of fairly bright stars with few other stars within it. This is the Square of Pegasus – and that's pre tty much it for this constellation! It is surprising that with the image of a winged horse featuring so prominently in the art and coins of the period that this constellation is so basic. In fact the Square of Pegasus can't even stake a claim to all of the four stars making it up as the top left star actually belongs to our next constellation, Andromeda, the to-be-sacrificed princess in our story. She is represented in the sky by a gentle curve of three stars reaching out from that top left star of Pegasus towards the zenith and her rescuer Perseus. Now with the top left star of Pegasus as the first, count three stars along the curve of Andromeda then move three stars up at right-angles towards the zenith. Just to the right of this third star is the famous Andromeda Nebula – but before you swing your binoculars on to it, wait! Try searching for it with the unaided eye. Ideally you need a moonless night (new moon this month is on the 13th so around that date would be good), few street-lights and a clear sky. You are looking for a small 'glowing ball of cotton wool'. When you spot it, be amazed. Lying at a distance of fifteen-followed-by-18-noughts miles from the Earth this is the most distant object that can be seen with the naked eye! You are also travelling backwards in time as the light you are now seeing left there 2.5 million years ago, so you are seeing the Nebula not as it is now, but as it was then! Actually, nebula is a misnomer as it is not made of dust but is another galaxy of stars, like our own Milky Way - and is on a collision course with us! But not to worry, the encounter is 4.5 billion years away and, because the stars in both galaxies are so far apart they (and their planets) would pass each other by without colliding.

The last participant in our saga is the sea monster about to attack Andromeda. Follow a line down from the left two stars of the Square of Pegasus towards the southern horizon and just before you reach it you will see quite a bright star with other fainter ones stretching to the left towards the V of Taurus, a constellation we met last winter. This the long, winding constellation of Cetus, the Whale. It has little to draw attention to it – except ... Go back to the

Square of Pegasus and follow a line from the top right to the bottom left star again towards the horizon. As you pass through stars of Cetus can you see another bright star? If you do, then congratulations, you have been lucky enough to spot Mira, 'The Wonderful' during a bright phase in its cycle. It is a long period variable star which can be bright for a few months then dims to below naked-eye viability for almost a year.

Now let's leave our heroes and villains and see what else is happening in the night sky this month. Jupiter is still shining brightly in the S. It is closest to the Earth on the 1st. With steady binoculars you should be able to see an obvious disc, perhaps with thin dark bands across it and its largest moons – up to four pinpoints of light in a line on either side. On the 17th/18th there is a meteor shower, the Leonids. It is expected to provide a good display this year. Saturn, with its rings visible in steady binoculars, is low in the SW. The planet Uranus is in opposition on the 13th, visible as a tiny greenish disc halfway between Jupiter and Pleiades. Finally, an infrequent event happens on the morning of the 9th. The Moon passes in front of the planet Venus. This is called a planetary occultation and, bearing in mind that the Moon appears half a degree wide in the sky and all the planets (except Mercury) follow the line of the ecliptic, which is only three degrees wide, you would expect this to be a regular event. But it's not. On the morning of the 9th before 9.40 am, find the crescent Moon to the right of the Sun (which will already have risen **SO TAKE GREAT CARE!**) Bring your binoculars **slowly** towards to Moon from the right (making sure you keep the Sun well to the left) and, when you reach the crescent Moon, just to the left of it you will find Venus in the dawn sky. Watch for five or six minutes and you will see the Moon slowly cover the planet. Clyde Bish

In early December Love Topsham is running *Best Dressed Window Competitions* for shops and residents (it's definitely worth spending an evening wandering the streets to admire the spectacular displays).

And Love Topsham is back with its annual *Kids' Christmas Trail* from 3 pm on 13th December – end of term fun for children who can drop in to many of the town's shops to pick up festive treats. Details in next month's Clyst Valley News but as in past years it ends at the Museum where there are grown-up refreshments for parents and guardians, as well as something for the little ones.
