Village Hall

in hiring or using the Hall. The changes make it easier for Trustees to run the Hall and relieve them of some liabilities. As Trustees are all volunteers, we are hoping that this will make it easier to recruit new Trustees. Village Hall meetings are now open to everyone. If you have ideas about events, clubs or activities or just want to know what groups you can join, you are welcome to come along to our next committee meeting on Monday 18th September at 7.30 pm in the Hall. There will be an open session for any points people would like to raise. Our Treasurer will be retiring in December and we are looking for someone who could replace him. If you think this is a role you could fill, speak to our Chairman on 01392 874305 or come along to the meeting. Recruiting a new Treasurer is essential for the continued running of the Hall.




and certainly looked the part in their special kit. They were still singing football songs when the minibus tipped them




The end of the summer term finishes the school year. Our 'big' children enjoyed visits to their new schools and met their

Lady Seaward's CE Primary School

Consultation on Change of Age Range

II 's proposed to lower the age range of Lady Seaward's CE Primary School from 4 -11 years to 2 - 11 years of age with effect from 1st January 2024

Little Dragon's Pre School is an independently run, committee lea Pre-School on the school site with a capacity to take 20 children. The Pre School committee feel that they cannot sustain the increase in staff costs and have approached the school about merging the settings in order to best meet the needs of the children and the

The School and the Trust feel it is very important to the community to continue with this provision. First Federation Trust has experience of Nursery classes within the school structure and there is plenty of support available to the school. There will be no change in relation to the age range offered, nor reduction in places offered. If the proposal is approved, the main difference is that the pre-school will become a Nursery Class or part of a Foundation Stage Unit within the school. The children currently in the ore-school will be registered on the school rall. Parents will still need to make a separate application to Devon County Council for a place in the

Capital

The assets of the PreSchool will transfer to the School and continuing staff will TUPE across. The proposal will not affect the capacity of the School, nor the Planned Admission Number and will not out pressure on existing classroom space

The Process

Although there is risk the transfer could take time, we are passionate about ensuring the provision can stay open and continue to flourish. The by now renowned Sowton Village summer barbecue is planned for Saturday, 19th August. It is usually a sold-out event. We are praying for good weather on the day!

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



AND FINALLY...

The Sky Tonight: August



I'm sure you will have heard the saying 'once in a blue moon'. Well actually, it's twice. Let me explain. The time between one full moon and the next is 29.5 days so usually we only see one full moon each calendar month. However, as many of our months are a day or so longer than this, occasionally, two full moons squeeze in — as they do this month. When this happens the second is called a blue

moon. By chance both are also supermoons (joining the one in July that was mentioned in the BBC News), and that of the 31st will be the brightest full moon of the year. Although blue moons still look yellow there have been moons that were really blue. After the explosive eruption of Krakatoa in 1883 the volcanic dust thrown into the atmosphere treated the world to blue moons and unusually coloured sunsets for nearly three years!

Of course the Moon is not always full. Twice each lunation it can be a thin crescent, half or almost full (called gibbous). Only the half of the Moon facing the Sun is ever illuminated and when the Moon is between us and the Sun this lit side is facing away from the Earth so we can see nothing – a New Moon. As it begins its orbit around the Earth we begin to see a small part of the lit side, a crescent. (At this phase the rest of the Moon's disk may be faintly seen. This Earthshine is caused by the Sun's rays reflecting off of the clouds of the Earth on to the Moon,) As the orbit continues, more of the lit side becomes visible until the Sun, Earth and Moon line-up is a straight line and we see all the illuminated side and the Moon is full. (This alignment is called syzygy. A useful word for Scrabble perhaps?) The reverse happens as the Moon wanes and the orbit is completed after 27.32 days. But why is the time between full moons 2+ days longer than this? The Earth has also been moving along its orbit and it takes the Moon that time to catch it up to realign with the Sun and show this phase again.

Lunar eclipses – and there us one due in October – occur when the Full Moon moves into the shadow cast by the Earth into space. We don't get an eclipse every Full Moon because the Moon's orbit is tilted at 5 degrees to that of the Earth, so most of the time the position of the Full Moon is slightly above or below the Earth's shadow. Only if the orbit of the Moon happens to be crossing that of the Earth at Full Moon is the alignment perfect for an eclipse. Eclipses can be predicted. Even by observing the position of the Moon through its trilithons along with moving marker stones around the bluestone circle and the Aubrey holes our Bronze Age ancestors could have used Stonehenge to predict an eclipse! During an eclipse the Moon doesn't usually disappear but goes copper-coloured because the rays of the Sun, especially the red ones, get refracted (bent) by the Earth's atmosphere and strike the Moon, dimly illuminating it.

For a satellite our Moon has a relatively large mass and gravitational attraction. This prevents the Earth from wobbling too much on its axis, helping to stabilise our climate and its suitability for life. It also plays an important part in creating and controlling tides. The attraction of the Moon pulls the sea out into a bulge towards it creating a high tide (which is even larger if the Sun is also pulling in the same direction, as at New or Full Moon, creating a spring tide). This bulge stays facing the Moon whilst the Earth spins under it so 24 hours – and a bit more – later the Earth has rotated once and the same place gets another high tide. Why the 'bit more'? Because the Moon has also been moving on and the Earth has to catch up with the bulge. 'Just a moment!' I hear you say. 'We get two high tides each day!' True – because the Moon's gravity

not only pulls on the seas, it also pulls on the Earth itself causing it to move slightly towards the Moon leaving the sea behind to form a second bulge opposite the first! Of course gravity works both ways and the pull of the Earth on the Moon has caused its rotation to lock and synchronise to one rotation each orbit. This is why, from the Earth, we always see the same face of the Moon.

I'm not even going to try to describe where to find the various features of the Moon – seas, craters, mountains, etc. Go to www.moon.nasa.gov and on the Observe drop-down menu click on Daily Moon Guide for a day-by-day guided tour around the Moon.

Just before I sign off for this month a couple of other sights need a mention. On the nights of 12/13th the Perseid meteor shower will be in full swing. This is usually the best display of the year. And on the 27th Saturn is at opposition (ie at its closest to the Earth). Look for a bright yellowish 'star' quite low down in the SE. If you can keep your binoculars really steady you should be able to see the famous rings and maybe close by it a point of light. This is its largest satellite, Titan. Clyde Bish

Making the Deserts Bloom. Part 1



How it begins...

The issue of the environment is now a global concern. The following illustrates one area of hope.

Deserts now cover one third of the planet's landmass and they are still increasing rapidly due to desertification, eg the Sahara is increasing by over 250,000 acres per year and there are many other examples around the world.

How can this be stopped? Huge efforts are being made and one great example is the Negev Desert of southern Israel at Yatir

Forest, started in 1964 and which currently extends to 7,000 acres. It is designed to provide a green place for the people of southern Israel as well as helping to stop erosion, create new

topsoil from tree litter and encourage the return of wildlife. The principal tree is the drought-resistant Aleppo pine (*Pinus halepensis*) plus some Italian cypress (Cupressus sempervirens) and the blue acacia (Acacia cyanophyla).

The photographs show just a part of this hugely encouraging development which, hopefully, will provide inspiration for many more much-needed reclamation projects around the world. Tony Rule

Researching Family History: A Short Guide. Part 2 of 3



In Part 1 we covered getting started, using the websites, the census, births, marriages and deaths and parish records.

Names. Some family names and given names change over time. If the provider enables you to do so, input similar names when searching. Given names, eg Ann and Anne, usually do not pose a problem. Changes in family

names can be more troublesome because some changes can be almost unrecognisable.

Dates. When searching for the record of a death or burial, do check three things. First, if the name of a parent (or of both parents) is given in the record, that usually means that the record refers to a child and therefore not one of the people you are researching because they would have had no children. Second, and this is especially relevant to those families whose first born males are named after their father, do check that you are looking for a particular generation. It is tempting to think that you have found the death or burial of X when really you have found the death or burial of X's father or son. Third, if the family has a name (eg Hope) which is common in a locality and the given name (eg John) is also common, you might find entries for the death or burial of several John Hopes in an area. Check that there were no children with that name who were born or christened up to a few years before the death or burial of the individual you are researching in order to rule out children who died young.

Places. Place names can change over time. I run a Google search for a place I'm unfamiliar with to check the current spelling. The other reason why I Google place names is that 'geography matters'. The further one goes back in time the more likely it is that births, marriages and deaths/burials for an individual occur in the same place or locality. Mobility within the country was limited especially for those you are likely to find in the mid-19th century and earlier. The most common occupation for male heads of households in rural areas then was labourer or agricultural labourer and typically they would have limited knowledge of opportunities elsewhere and the resources to get there. Parish records of marriages typically include the parishes of the groom and bride. So if you find a woman was married in parish X but another

search suggests she was born 50 miles away in parish Z, ask yourself is that likely to be the same person. So, when you Google a place, access a map of its location and work out how near or far it is from another family event; the nearer it is, the more likely it is what you are looking for. If you don't find the event you are seeking in a particular county then search its adjacent counties. Looking horizontally - widening your search. Be patient. If at first you do not find what you are looking for, think of another way of getting to the information you seek. This is what I call looking horizontally'. For example, instead of trying to find a person's parents look for what you know (or think you know) about that person's siblings. Accessing information on siblings or children may confirm or otherwise a particular record/event or family relationship. Malcolm Macmillen

It is a way for each person to be seen and heard, then agreeing a positive way to move forward with their lives, whether the conflict has been short or long term, or a one-off.

Are you wondering if mediation would work for you? Then there is one question to answer that will let you know, 'Do I want to be **right or reconciled?**' Does my relationship with the other person mean more to me than proving my point and getting my way, whether that be my partner, child, relative, work colleague, neighbour?

I've had to ask myself that question many times after 44 years of marriage. 🥹 Julie Hodge
