Get to Know Your Parish Council. The role of the Parish Council is to represent the views and needs of its community. It is funded by you and works for you, with integrity and transparency at the heart of everything it does. The Parish Council website contains information on governance and transparency. finance. meetings. projects (www.bishopsclyst.org.uk).

Parish Council meetings are open to the public so do come along and get to know how the Council operates. Agendas and minutes are posted on the website and parish noticeboards, and if you feel strongly about an issue there is an opportunity in the open session for members of the public to speak.

Your Councillors. Councillors get involved in community projects, they take part in debates and make informed decisions in the best interest of the community and, collectively, are responsible for ensuring the Council finances are managed appropriately and transparently. When carrying out Council activities, Councillors have a legal duty to adhere to the Council's Code of Conduct which is based on the 'seven principles of public life': selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty, leadership. Training and support are available for all Councillors.

Diversity. The Council needs people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect the community to put themselves forward for election.

Community Grants. Community grants of up to £500 are available to groups, clubs and voluntary organisations based in the parish for non-commercial activities which benefit residents of the parish. Please see further details on our website (www.bishopsclyst.org.uk/community-grants/).








Norman's Weather Report

This was not a typical April, as the showers were more than light and nourishing, but at times particularly heavy – the 11th and 27th of the month <u>each</u> providing ³/₄ inch of rain. So the total rainfall was 76 mm (3 inches), exactly the same as that in April 2019. The three Aprils between 2019 and 2023 totalled only 67 mm (2.6 inches)!

A 20-year average amount here at Ebford is 1.9 inches but each decade included four dry Aprils, when the weather came mainly from the eastern quarter.

What's happened this month?

Local Elections

Local elections give adults the chance to choose who represents them in their towns and councils - basically, at a more local level.

They took place on Thursday 4th May as adults went out to vote for their mayors and councillors. The voting started at 7am and stopped at 10pm. People must be over 18 years old and have registered in order to vote.

Did you know that members of the Royal family do not vote? They are not supposed to have 'favourites' within the political parties (groups representing the people).

This round of elections was different because it was the first time that voters needed to have photo identification (ID) to prove it was really them. In the 2021 local elections, there were 79 cases of alleged voter fraud (source: electroralcommission.org.uk) which is where somebody uses someone else's identity to vote.

Alleged: this means the cases were referred to the Police to investigate.

The conclusion of the election was that councillor Mike Howe was re-elected. He is an independent councillor which means he is not linked to a political party (for example, the Conservatives or Labour).

The Sky Tonight



The constellations of the Lion, Herdsman, and Virgin that we 'star hopped' to find in May are still well in evidence for night-time viewing but this month we'll concentrate on just one star, our star, the Sun (in which case I suppose I should retitle the article *The Sky Todau*!)

June is a significant month for the Sun as on the 21st the summer solstice occurs. On this date, because of

the tilt of the Earth's axis, the Sun would appear overhead at the Tropics. In 240 BC Eratosthenes used this information to calculate the circumference of the Earth. When the Sun was overhead at Syene in Egypt he observed it was 7.2 degrees from the vertical in Alexandria 800 km to the north. Now you can repeat his calculation. Divide the sphere of the Earth (360 degrees) by this segment (7.2) then multiply it by the distance (800 km). Your answer will be pretty close to the figure accepted today!

For us, at about 50 degrees N, not only is the Sun is at its highest altitude for the year around noon on the 21st but it also rises well to the north of east and sets well north of west, so making its longest journey across the sky giving us the greatest hours of daylight – the Longest Day.

The Sun being above the horizon for longer in the summer months is obviously one contributing factor to the warmer weather, but it's only part of the story. Another is the high angle that the Sun's rays strike the Earth. In winter, because of the tilt of the Earth's axis, the same amount of heat energy is much more spread out. One factor that surprisingly has little effect is the distance from the Earth to the Sun. Because of the elliptical orbit of the Earth this is actually 5 million miles less in January!

Solstice means 'stand still' – which is what the position of sunset on the horizon appears to do around this date. You can check this out by noting where the Sun sets from about 14th to 28th June. You'll find very little change. But wait until the Sun has just disappeared from view. Never look at the Sun with the naked eye (or even through dark glass) and never with binoculars.

Humans have for many thousands of years used the Sun to measure time. The oldest sundial can be found in Egypt and dates from 1500 BC. However, the Sun (or more accurately, the Earth) is not a very accurate time keeper. This is due to the Earth moving at a variable speed along its elliptical orbit and also (again!) by having an inclined rotational axis. In consequence sundials can be up to 17 minutes 'fast' in autumn. The sundial in Plymouth city centre has a correction graph, the Equation of Time, fixed to its base. Differences in longitude also cause inaccuracies. Our mechanical/digital clocks are set to the time at Greenwich (hence GMT) but the difference in Sun-time from east to west in Britain is over half an hour. Here in the Clyst Valley time runs 14 minutes slow! And, of course, at the moment we have purposely set our time to be one hour ahead of solar time!

The position of the Sun can also give us our orientation. If you aim the hour hand of an analogue watch towards the Sun, a line half way between that hand and 12 on the dial will point south. To determine an east-west line, put a stick vertically in flat ground on a sunny day and mark the tip of the shadow. Wait a while then mark the new shadow tip. Join the two marks to scribe an east-west line.

Turning now to the Sun as a star you should be pleased to find out that we orbit a very ordinary, middle-sized, middle-aged, rather boring star. Why pleased? Well, imagine what life would be like if the Sun was prone to exploding! Or one of a pair like the many double stars we have encountered in the past months. Day-length and the seasons would be totally haphazard! Or a variable star that kept changing brightness - and heat output. (Considering the number of Ice Ages the Earth has been through it would be reasonable to think that variability in energy output from the Sun would be responsible but of the many possible culprits the Sun is not considered one of them.) Not that our Sun is totally boring. It develops spots on an 11-year cycle, which is nearing its maximum, so now is a good time to look for them - very carefully! Here's how to do it safely. Make a small hole in a piece of card and let the sun shine through this on to a piece of white card to act as a screen. Adjust the distance between them and you will get quite a sharp bright image of the sun with any sunspots showing up as small dark patches. Sunspots are magnetic storms that can last a long time. If you spot one, look for it on subsequent days. You will notice it move towards the west limb of the Sun. It is not the spot moving but the Sun rotating. It takes about one month to make one revolution so if you see a large spot disappear over the edge you might be lucky enough to see it reappear two weeks later. The Sun is forever bombarding us with various charged particles, many of which would strip our atmosphere were it not for the Earth's magnetic field deflecting them – and as a byproduct producing the Northern Lights for our delight. Did you catch a glimpse in May?

Secret Gardens of Topsham: Don't Just Save the Date – Buy a Programme!

In addition to seeing the gardens themselves, green-fingered visitors can enjoy a specialist plant stall at the Museum's waterside garden – including selections from some of the Secret Gardens themselves — and tea and delicious homemade cakes at two lovely gardens along the route.

All proceeds from the event go towards running Topsham Museum which has its main building in one of the 17th century houses on Strand, close to the Exe, and which will be open for visitors on the Secret Gardens day. Topsham Museum has a popular and frequently-updated website and virtual tour, plus an online shop. The Museum additionally has displays in a red telephone box in the town, serving as a year-round outpost and attraction.
