Village Hall

New Status for the Village Hall. The Village Hall officially transferred to become a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 1st July. Apart from a having to make payment to the CIO rather than the Village Hall, users should not notice any difference

in hiring or using the Hall. The changes make it easier for Trustees to run the Hall and relieve them of some liabilities. As Trustees are all volunteers, we are hoping that this will make it easier to recruit new Trustees. Village Hall meetings are now open to everyone. If you have ideas about events, clubs or activities or just want to know what groups you can join, you are welcome to come along to our next committee meeting in November (timing to be confirmed). There will be an open session for any points people would like to raise.

New Treasurer Needed. Our Treasurer will be retiring in December and we are looking for someone who could replace him. If you think this is a role you could fill, please speak to our Chairman on 01392 874305 or come along to the meeting. Recruiting a new Treasurer is essential for the continued running of the Hall.

Defibrillator. The Village Hall now has a defibrillator which is fitted near to the entrance in a fully accessible cabinet. There are RevivR posters and flyers in the kitchen at the Hall. If you are in the Hall, feel free to take one away. If you scan the QR code on these resources with your 'phone, you will be taken directly to RevivR training. You can also use this link for a short instructional video Learn CPR in 15 minutes with RevivR[™] CPR Training.

Many of us will witness a cardiac arrest in our lifetime. Be ready for that day. The BHF's digital training tool – RevivR, teaches you vital CPR skills and how to use a defibrillator, in just 15 minutes on your mobile 'phone or tablet. Created by BHF's medical experts, the tool will take you through a real-life scenario, so you feel prepared for an emergency. You never know when you'll need to give someone CPR, so learn today. Our thanks go to British Heart Foundation and Bishops Clyst Parish Council for grants towards providing this equipment.

Watching Your Speed in Our Communities!



Community Speed Watch (CSW) aims to educate drivers who exceed the speed limit and make communities safer by reducing vehicle speeds. Volunteers assist the police in achieving this aim by monitoring vehicle speeds in locations where speeding is a known problem. Volunteers are registered and only operate at

police-approved sites and are trained in health and safety and how to use the speed monitoring equipment. A CSW volunteer records and logs details of vehicles exceeding the speed limit from which a staged warning system is employed using advisory letters. Details of vehicles which have already been recorded exceeding the speed limit are then passed on to the local police for attention. CSW operates under the direction of the police.

Ian Adams, Coordinator of the Devon and Cornwall Police Community Speed Watch for Clyst St Mary, said, 'Speed is one of the main factors in fatal road collisions. The difference of a few mph can mean the difference between life and death. Small increases in speed can have significant consequences and the faster someone is driving the less time they have to stop if something unexpected happens. It's so important that people drive according to the conditions of the road.'

Ian went on to say, 'Consider the consequences of causing injury or even death to others due to driving at excess speed. I don't want anyone in our local community to get the dreaded knock on their door, hence the reason I have launched Community Speed Watch in Clyst St Mary and am looking for volunteers to join our CSW group.'

If you are interested in supporting the safety of our local community through CSW, you can register to join the group and complete your online training by going to CommunitySpeedWatch.org.

Norman's Weather Report



August was rather wet; unfortunate for both farmers and holidaymakers, with 71 mm (2.8 inches) of rain recorded here at Ebford. This was well spread over three of the four weeks; the only dry spell was early, between the 5th and 11th.

Over the last ten years the monthly average rainfall for August is 68 mm (2.7 inches): individual values ranging between 28 mm in 2022, fairly memorable, and 143 mm in 2015. As said in the previous report, averages have little useful significance in any current situation! Norman Cann

Our new Reception children walked in with confidence on Wednesday and have settled very well indeed since. Miss Harvey-Jones has enjoyed visiting our three classes and is pleased to have seen all the children happy and already enjoying their learning.

The main theme for KS1 this term is 'Movers and Shakers'. This project teaches children about historically significant people who have had a major impact on the world. They will learn to use timelines, stories and historical sources to find out about the people featured and use historical models to explore their significance.

The KS2 topic this term is 'Sow, Grow and Farm'. This project teaches children about the features and characteristics of land use in agricultural regions across the world, including a detailed exploration of significant environmental areas. In October, we will be attending Farmwise at Westpoint Arena which will teach the children about many different farming techniques and ways in which land is looked after in the UK. It will enable the children to experience farming first hand and will really bring their learning to life.

Hallowe'en

Hallowe'en originated two thousand years ago with a Celtic festival called **Samhain**. This day would symbolise the end of summer and harvest time and was the day before the new year would start on 1st November. They would light bonfires and wear costumes to scare off these ghosts. AND FINALLY... The Sky Tonight: October



There are many stories locked in the stars but none is so dramatic as that told in the constellations of autumn: a king, his queen, their beautiful daughter, a sea monster and of course a dashing hero (who's already been busy disposing of one baddie) – plus a flying horse! It's a long story so I've split it into two parts.

Once upon a time...Look to the north (at our usual 10 pm.

mid-month time) and you will see the Plough low down but the right way up for once. Follow the Pointers past the Pole Star and at about the same distance the other side you will find a W of stars just East of overhead. The pattern could be seen as a chair, and so it is. It is the throne of our queen, Cassiopeia. In Greek mythology she was Queen of Aethiopia who boasted that she was more beautiful than Neptune's Sea Nymphs. Not a good idea as Greek gods can be very touchy and, true to form, a sea monster was sent by the god of the sea to ravage the land. The central star of the West is spinning at some phenomenal speed and recently emitted a gas cloud which contained elements that indicated that this was a star running out of fuel. When that happens it will go supernova. This could happen quite soon (astronomically speaking) – but probably not tonight!

Now let's find Cassiopeia's husband, King Cepheus. Facing North, find the West of Cassiopeia again then look to the left, almost directly overhead (called the zenith) for a rough square of stars with one below forming a triangle with the lower side, the whole thing enclosed in the triangle formed by Deneb in the Swan, the Pole Star and Cassiopeia. Now look halfway between the stars forming the base of the square to find the deep red 'Garnet Star' of William Herschel (who discovered of the planet Uranus in 1781 from his house in Bath – well worth a *visit is you are in that city*). This is a variable star, but nowhere near so important as another in this constellation. At the top right of the square find a small triangle of stars, the lowest of which is named Delta cephei, another variable star, but a very special one. It has a period of exactly 5 days 8 hours 47 minutes and 27 seconds. Why is this important? Because any variable star of this type with this period will have the same real brightness. So if another star is seen with this period but it looks dimmer then it must be further away from us. Without going into detailed formulae - just believe me - knowing how much dimmer enables us to calculate its distance. This is particularly important as Herschel had noticed that some of the nebulae he observed were made up of stars, not just gas, and wondered if they were galaxies, like our own Milky Way, but more distant, but had no way of checking this. Once Cephid-type variable stars were found in these nebulae their distances could be measured and they were found to be way outside our galaxy. They were in galaxies of their own!

We've met the king and queen. Now step forward the hero Perseus, fresh from killing the Gorgon monster, an unpleasant woman with hair of snakes whose glance would turn you to stone. He still has her head – which will prove useful when the saga continues next month. *Again face North and find the West of Cassiopeia. You will notice that the V forming one half of the W is flatter than the other. Follow the direction this points down toward the North East*

and you will find an orange star at the top of two lines of bright stars. This is the constellation of Perseus. Not a very impressive hero – but he does have a couple of tricks up his sleeve, so to speak. Find the fourth star down the right line. It may look quite bright – or not. This is Algol – Arabic for 'Winking Demon'. It regularly changes in brightness by about a magnitude and a half – but it is not another Cephid. It is an eclipsing binary –two stars which revolve around each other, as do all binary stars, except these two do it along our line of sight so that every 2.5 days the dimmer (and larger) companion gets in front of the brighter one and blocks out its light for a short while. The ancient Arab astronomers must have observed these fluctuations otherwise why the name? The other sight to look for in Perseus is his sword handle. Look halfway between the stars of Cassiopeia you used as a guide and that top star of Perseus and you will see two misty patches. Binoculars will show this as two star-clusters close together. Patrick Moore considered this to be the loveliest object in the sky.

We'll return to the saga next month but what else is happening in the heavens? On the 21^{st} / 22^{nd} look out for the Orionid meteor shower resulting from debris left from Halley's comet as it orbits the Sun. Also, beginning at 8.35 pm on the 28^{th} there is the partial lunar eclipse I mentioned last month. It won't be very impressive as only 12 per cent of the Moon is obscured but keep a look out anyway. The planet of the month has to be Jupiter, shining brightly low in the East with the eclipsing Moon close on the 28^{th} . With steady binoculars you should be able to see an obvious disc, perhaps with thin dark bands across it and up to four pinpoints of light in a line either side –the moons discovered by Galileo.
