

EDITOR'S NOTE



Hello and welcome to this festive December edition of the CVN. The magnificent painting on our cover is entitled 'Adoration of the Shepherds' by the Italian Baroaue artist Mattia Pretti (1613-1699). It was thought to have been painted in 1678 and is in the collection of the Walker Art Gallery in Liverpool.

As we fast approach the time of celebration for many of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, and its message of peace on earth, the Holy Land is convulsed in the most obscene agonies of violence and brutality, tearing apart families, leaving them to grieve the loss of so many loved ones and driving the deepest divisions in the communities in that region that could take generations to heal. It seems we haven't learnt very much from that story of over 2,000 years ago.

A short personal anecdote: In the 1990s I was working in the Occupied Palestinian Territories. It was a time of optimism after the White House Lawn handshake between Israeli Prime Mister Rabin and Yasser Arafat, Chairman of the PLO. On Christmas Eve in, I think, 1994, I went with a group from the Anglican Cathedral in Jerusalem for a late-night service at the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. We gathered in a small, dark side chapel and were about to start when in walked Yasser Arafat, wearing his customary military fatigue and kaffiyeh (headdress). Although, as a Muslim, he did not participate in the service directly, he stayed for the entire duration, wishing to show his respect for Christians at their special time. Despite his (unwarranted, in my view) reputation as a militant, I think he demonstrated with that gesture his desire for reconciliation and peace. It's a great pity that those in power in the Holy Land today find it impossible to emulate that moment of hope.

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
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THE CLYST VALLEY NEWS IS STILL SEEKING TO RECRUIT A TREASURER OR SECRETARY

Clyst St Mary Church: Financial Crisis



Our thanks to all those who have supported our appeal for funds for the new oil tank at the church and to Bishops Clyst Parish Council and Devon Historic Churches Trust for their

grants towards the work. The new oil tank is now installed and services can continue.

However, we are still facing a serious financial crisis at Clyst St Mary Church. Like everyone else, the church is not immune to rising costs. We need to increase our income to keep pace with inflation and we have had to carry out a number of major repairs in the last two years. We have just been advised that we must replace our oil tank at a cost of around £3000. We have very little money in the account and our annual budget is showing a deficit. Without a significant increase in our income we may not be able to keep the church open.

If you value the church and, like us, want it to continue as part of our community life, would you be willing to support the church

The festive season is almost upon us, and we've been gearing up for it for weeks – in fact, as soon as Halloween


was out the way it seemed we were straight into organising Christmas!

Many of us who regularly walk across our historic Clyst St Mary bridge, the scene of two great battles, will remember how, about two years ago, the Environment Agency planted a large number and variety of willow trees on the swampy southside of the bridge. Sadly, only approximately fifteen have survived but they are doing well.

The majority are White Willows (Salix Alba) and one straight line



Remembrance



Graham Gerdes led the Act of Remembrance at the lychgate on Remembrance Sunday. The poppy wreath was laid on behalf of the Parish Council by Councillor Ben Girvin. A short service followed, taken by Mark Lovett and Debbie Jung led prayers. A large number of people attended, standing in the road outside the lychgate. The rain fortunately held off until later.

Local History Uncovered

During a second tidy up of the churchyard, several graves, hidden for a long time by a large rhododendron bush, have come to light. Mark Lovett, Phil Dent and Debbie Jung were giving it and the accompanying brambles a severe prune when they discovered some of the earliest

graves in the churchyard, dating from the 1850s. One is of a man, his wife and their 20 monthold child but the names are hard to read. The church was consecrated on 28th September 1844 but may not have been completely finished by then as the earliest grave in the churchyard (near the main door) is that of J G Hallett who died in May 1845 aged 12. He was killed when building materials fell from the roof.

Daphne (Daff) Lemmey 4th July 1945 – 27th September

Although, as her next-door-neighbour, I only knew Daff since her arrival in Woodbury, I feel honoured to have been a good friend of hers and will miss her a lot. I am grateful to her husband Rev'd Bill, to her sons Saxon and Justin (sadly Dane died just over a year ago) and to Rev'd Ann Gibbs for providing these highlights from Daff's life. Sue Bury



Born in Birmingham, Daff went to Australia as a Ten Pound Pom, where she met lots of new friends and had her three sons. Sadly her marriage to Roger did not last, and after living together in Birmingham and then Bournemouth, Roger and Saxon returned to Australia. Whilst in Bournemouth with her other two young sons, Daff gained a degree in geography and became a committed Christian and her strong faith remained with her for the rest of her life. Daff became a residential project worker, working with troublesome, homeless adolescents with the Children's Society and there met Bill, then an assistant youth worker. One thing led to another, and they married some six months later on 12th December 1987.

They moved to Yeovil when Daff got a new job with Stonham Housing, and they both worked as unpaid youth workers for a local free evangelical church, and then ended up housing various younger and older people in their home. Daff also ran a drop-in centre, not without its difficulties, in Yeovil. While Bill trained for the ministry in Cambridge, Daff lived in Lyme Regis. When Bill became licensed, they moved first to New Milton, then to Porlock, where Daff was involved in many church activities, particularly a drop-in coffee morning.

Daff was a keen walker, and with a group of friends walked half of the coast-to-coast walk, and part of the West Highland Way in Scotland. She is remembered as a strong, unsentimental and feisty person, who knew her own mind. She loved the beauty of nature, particularly the sea, and when younger, spent many happy occasions at the beach, body-surfing the waves. She encouraged her sons to get involved in activities such as walking, sports, music, dancing and singing amongst many others. Daff believed in the concept of 'get involved, or you miss out'.

Daff's friends describe her as being kind, compassionate and thoughtful, a person who would come to their aid when they were struggling – there was no fuss, but she would be there when needed. She didn't care what other people might think or say – she spoke and acted true to herself at all times. She was inspirational because those who knew her well knew that she had faced challenges herself and therefore when she gave anyone 'tough love' her honesty really upheld and encouraged the recipient. One thing about Daff was that once she decided on something, she did not change her mind.

Rev'd Ann recalls: 'Daff sometimes reminded me of a tigress in her attitude towards Bill; she was fiercely protective of him and hugely supportive – although I also know that she could despair over his ability to lose things! Indeed when he left Porlock, the card that a local artist created for him showed Daff following after Bill collecting the various things he left as he went on his way.'

Daff had a fall just before Easter this year, recovered well over a six-week period, but then, very suddenly, was diagnosed with a fast-growing brain tumour (she had previously been diagnosed with a rare blood disorder, and then with a low-grade leukaemia). She deteriorated very quickly over less than a month, and died peacefully at home on 27th September. The family are indebted to superb healthcare from the emergency response team, from Marie Curie and from Hospiscare.

# **Kids' Corner**

### What's happening this month?

#### Christmas!

## When you think of Christmas, you probably think of a Christmas tree, covered in twinkly lights and decorations.

Many people think the tradition of Christmas trees started in Victorian Britain which was from 1837 until 1901. Queen Victoria and her husband Prince Albert really loved Christmas. However, it is believed that the tradition actually dates back much further than that.



The tradition originally came from Germany, where Prince Albert was born, and was introduced to England during the Georgian period, when King George III was on the throne. His wife Charlotte was German and she was thought to decorate a tree for her family in the 1790s. Queen Victoria and Prince Albert are thought to be the ones who made it extremely popular and fashionable to decorate a tree at Christmas like this.

### Get involved...

#### AND FINALLY...

#### The Sky Tonight: December



During the year the Earth has been following its orbit around the Sun, bringing new constellations into view each month. Now, as we move into December, we have completed our tour of the heavens – almost.

If you stand out under the night sky at about 9 pm midmonth you will notice a bright yellow star almost directly overhead. This is where we will start our tour this month.

This star, its yellow colour showing that it is in middle-age, like our Sun (but it's much, much larger) is in the constellation of Auriga, the Charioteer. The bright star is named Capella, meaning she-goat (the charioteer being depicted as having a goat on one shoulder and three kids on his arm!). *Look to the right and slightly down from Capella and you will find a triangle of three fainter stars*. These are the kids in their stall. The top star of the triangle is an eclipsing binary, like Algol in the constellation of Perseus that we met in October, except that the main star is a supergiant so that when its smaller companion moves in front, it makes little difference to the overall brightness. The pair also share a very large orbit so one complete cycle takes 27 years, with the slightly dimmer phase lasting a whole year! *The main stars of the constellation form a kite-shape with Capella at the right end of the cross bar. If you sweep* 

the sky with binoculars about halfway down the line between the left end of the cross bar and the star forming the lower point of the kite you will find a line of three-star clusters. That to the left, M37, looking like a misty patch the size of the full moon is an open cluster, one of the finest in the sky. To the right of it is M36, a bright open cluster of about 60 stars and to the right again is M38, another small cluster.

To complete our journey around the zodiac there are two constellations we have yet to find – the first and the last. Look due south and about half way up the sky you will see the bright planet Jupiter. Just above and on a line between the Square of Peqasus and the Pleiades you will find the line of three main stars that make up the constellation of Aries, the Ram. There is little more to say about this constellation except that it is against these stars the apparent path of the Sun crosses from the southern to the northern half of the sky at the spring equinox. As a result this point was chosen as the datum for celestial longitude (just as the Greenwich meridian was chosen as the point of zero terrestrial longitude). It is called the First Point of Aries because it was in this constellation when chosen – but it's not there any more. You'll remember that the Earth wobbles on its axis and this has caused the crossing point to recess back into the neighbouring and last constellation of the zodiac, Pisces, the Fish.

Finding our final constellation, Pisces, is not difficult even if the stars making it up are quite faint. Look for a line of stars between Aries and Pegasus and another under the Square. They converge just below where Jupiter is at the moment. That's the constellation! Pisces has no features of note but it is worth finding even if only to know that over the year you have seen all the constellations of the zodiac.

Turning now to the planets. On the  $4^{th}$  (and for the following week or so) Mercury is furthest from Sun in the evening sky so this is your best chance of spotting it. Soon after sunset (BUT STILL TAKE CARE!) look for the planet with binoculars low down in the south-west. Saturn is still quite bright and is due south at 4.30 pm. The crescent moon is below it on the 17<sup>th</sup>. Jupiter, in the southern sky, is still by far the most obvious of the planets, with the faint *Uranus and Neptune in much the same positions as last month* – not surprising really as it takes them about 84 and 164 years respectively to circle the sky once!

With regard to other celestial events, on the night of the 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> we may be in for a rare display of the Andromedid meteors. They don't often perform - it's a bit hit and miss, but if they do you can see one every minute! In contrast, on the 13<sup>th</sup>/14<sup>th</sup> the Geminid meteors usually give the best annual show of celestial fireworks. They are bright and move slowly across the sky and originate, unusually, not from a comet trail but from an asteroid, Phaethon. Just one further note. On the 22<sup>nd</sup> at 3.27 am the Sun will be at its most southerly latitude giving us our shortest day.

The Eastern sky heralds the return of the stars of winter with Orion, his belt pointing up to Aldebaran, the Eye of the Bull and to Sirius, the Dog Star, low on the horizon.

The celestial sphere has turned and another year has passed. I hope you have enjoyed our monthly wanderings through the ever-changing night sky – but there is still much to see... Clyde Bish


